

Since the last project update the trunk has been finished off with granite finish Zolatone



I fabricated the gas tank mounting frame using two inch angle iron.



The front end suspension components have been powder coated and loaded with new bushings and ball joints.



The rear end was disassembled for inspection (3.55 gears) and rear axle bearing replacement.





Many thanks to Harvey and his sidekick Richard for their huge help reinstalling the detailed rear end. Ava says thank you too otherwise she would have been stuck helping me. Can't forget Ann's famous peanut butter cookies that keep us fortified.



With the rear end in place I installed the disc brake assembly.



I installed the fuel cell in the finished mount and prewired the fuel sending unit. A zip tie every inch!



The fuel cell is permanently mounted and the rear disc brakes have been plumbed.



The engine has been completely rebuilt and is ready to be dropped between the frame rails.



With the installation of the wheels and new 14 inch wide radial Mickey Thompson's the back half of the car is now done. This is the view the competition will see.

California AAA Stop Sign History



Today I had the pleasure to talk with Matt Roth of the Auto Clubs Archives in The Los Angles area. (213-741-4486). Matt was able to give me a lot of road sign information that I thought was

interesting. My stop sign has the fish eye reflectors(All missing) holes and the stencil E7930 on the back. I was hoping he could give me some information about the sign. He told me that the fish eye signs were all before 1936. And good luck finding replacement fish eyes. He also stated that technically the Auto Club still owns the sign but, he wasn't going to ask for it back. Here are some interesting facts I learned from Matt.

The Auto Club made signs from 1906-1956. The state took over to control Font, size, color, etc in 1956. To this day The Northern and Southern Auto Clubs are on the advisory Board to the state for the signs. The first signs the Auto Club made were directional Signs. City's made the stop signs. The First stop signs were called "Boulevard Stop" signs. That's because the stops were placed to stop traffic entering the main boulevard and disrupting the traffic flow. It's funny how you forget these things and when you Hear it again it rings that bell. Oh ya that's what we called them!! The first color for stop signs was YELLOW. In the 1920's all stop sign changed to RED. The Auto Club has made over 400,000 signs most were directional signs. LA was the first city to have a traffic Engineer. (Ralph Dorcy). Mr. Dorcy was a innovative guy and worked under the police department. A couple of things he was instrumental in was the RED curb and the pedestrian push button at cross walks. I asked Mr. Roth if the lettering on the back of my sign told the year or location of the sign, as I heard the the letter "A" stood for 1934 and the letter B for 1935, ETC. He said he had never heard of this but I had peaked an interest. He thought the letter meant a area, zone or county and the number a sequence number. In closing he said he would e-mail me further information and maybe a different contact to call. Thanks to The Auto Clubs Mr. Roth for informative afternoon. I will follow-up with any more info as it comes to me.

Lesson 3:


