The Kitchen Scoop on New York - Style Cheesecake

Growing up in a small town in Western New York State dessert was ice cream, pie or cake and served on special occasions. My father travelled for work and on his return would tell me about enjoying cheesecake eaten in restaurants in New York City and Boston, but there was no cheesecake in my childhood. When I did try it, it was love at first bite.

I like my cheesecake heavy, dense, rich. This recipe from The New York Times Cookbook is all those things calling for two-and-a-half pounds of cream cheese, five eggs, two yolks. While supposedly providing eight servings, those would be large slabs; I find a smaller slice of this delectable treat is usually enough.

Cheesecake De Luxe

Preheat oven to 475 degrees
Serves 8

Crust: For 1 (9-inch) spring form pan

Mix together and press into pan:

1 cup fine graham cracker crumbs

3 Tablespoons sugar

3 Tablespoons melted butter

Cinnamon and Nutmeg

Filling:

2-1/2 pounds cream cheese (5 8-ounce blocks)

1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract

1 teaspoon finely grated lemon rind

1-3/4 cups

3 Tablespoons flour

Pinch of salt

5 eggs

2 egg yolks

1/4 cup heavy cream



Beat cream cheese until fluffy. Add vanilla and lemon rind.

Combine sugar, the flour and salt in a small bowl. Gradually blend into cheese mixture. Beat in eggs and egg yolks, one at a time, and the cream. Beat well.

Pour mixture into the prepared crust. Bake 8 to 10 minutes.

Reduce the heat to 200 degrees. Bake for 1-1/2 hours longer, or until set. Turn off heat.

Allow cake to remain in the oven with the door ajar for 30 minutes.

Cool on a rack. Chill.

Fantastic on its own, this cheesecake gets a bit more decadent (if that's even possible) served with a dollop of whipped cream and a few berries. Enjoy!

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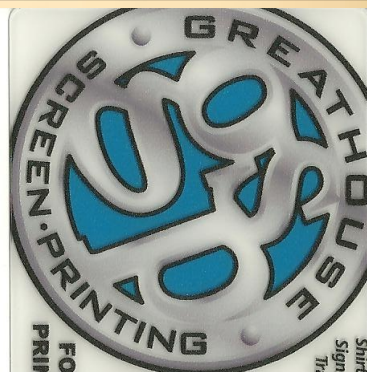


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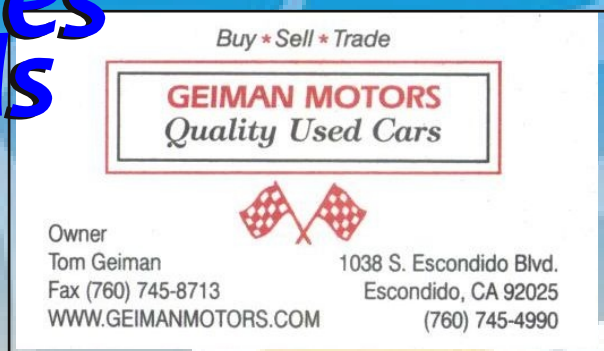
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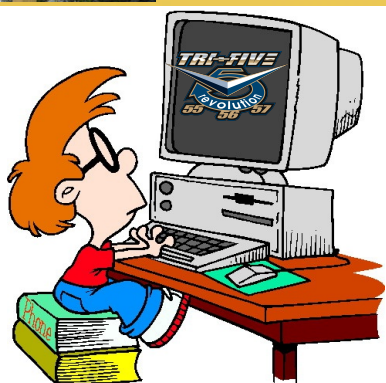
