Kitchen Scoop on Forever Friends & Chocolate Cookies

Today is Thanksgiving Day, or, more appropriately, Giving Thanks Day. We're thankful for being charter members of the Tri-5 Revoluntion. You continue to be a great group. We are thankful for each and everyone of you: for your friendship, your help is making Goldie become the best she could be, and for your continued interest in the wonderful Tri-5's.

It's been a long time since I shared a recipe with you. Here's an easy soft chocolate cookie you may enjoy for the holidays.

Soft Chocolate Cookies

1 cup butter, softened to room temperature

1-1/2 cups sugar

2 large eggs, room temperature

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

2 cups flour

2/3 cups baking coca

3/4 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 teaspoon salt

Confectioners' Sugar



In a large bowl, cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one a time, beating well after each addition. Beat in vanilla. Combine the flour, cocoa baking soda and salt in a small bowl. Gradually add to the creamed mixture and mix well. Cover and refrigerate for 1 hour or until easy to handle.


Roll dough into 1-inch balls. Place 2-inches apart on an ungreased baking sheets. Flatten with a fork if desired. Bake at 350 detrees for 8-10 minutes or until edges are firm, but not brown. Remove to wire racks. Dust warm cookies with confectioners's sugar.

I've been talking about the growing popularity of trucks and the increasing number of truck-only shows. Dino's Git Down, an all GM truck show in Glendale, AZ must be one of the largest all-truck shows in existence. Dino's Git Down began its 13-year history in Dino Battilana's backyard as a place for Chevrolet truck owners to get together and share their trucks and stories and has grown rapidly in popularity since. After three years it had grown large enough to become an actual truck show and along with that came the first annual Git Down. This show has continued to grow and grow into a huge event. This year,

the 10th annual event took place over Veterans Day weekend at State Farm Stadium in Glendale Arizona, where the Cardinals play football.

Interestingly enough, there is no entry fee to attend, which may play a part in why it is so popular. This year's flyer advertised Dino's Git Down as having 5000+ GM trucks on display and 130 vendors. Previous shows included a swap meet, however, since this was the first show at the stadium the swap meet was omitted with the likelihood of returning next year. There was a drawing for three (yes, three) LS crate motors. And finally, there was a cruise route around the area for trucks to just cruise throughout the day.

Linda and I decided we needed to make the trip to Arizona to see what all the hoopla was about. We left home in Linda's '69 Chevrolet C20 pickup on the Thursday before the show and arrived in time for the Pre-Party starting at 5:30 pm in an industrial area where Tre5 Customs and IKandy Paintworks opened their shops for everyone to see some of their work. By the time we arrived, the area was swarming with a couple hundred or more trucks & cars and wall to wall people. They offered free pizza and drinks to everyone, but the sheer number of people made it impossible to keep up with the demand. After a couple hours of visiting the businesses and looking at some of the vehicles, we decided to bail out and find us some dinner before returning to the hotel.

The Friday show was open exclusively to Chevrolet and GMC trucks 1998 and older. We headed to State Farm stadium around 7:00 am and followed a line of other trucks into the east entrance gate where trucks were lining up in rows to get into the show. These rows were a pre-stage area waiting

their turn to enter the show area. Hundreds of early birds were in line at 4:00 am or earlier. Gates to enter the show didn't open until 8:00 am, so there was a bunch of lines of trucks ahead of us waiting to get in.

When we finally entered the show area, we were directed where to go and where to park. However, those wanting to go to a specific area were allowed to deviate off the route. We found a parking space in an area not far from the vendor area and across the way from the Great Lawn





and Beer Garden area. The first thing

we needed to do was locate the scooter vendor so Linda could get her scooter. It was supposed to be in the west parking lot with all of the vendors, but a last minute decision by someone relocated the vendor to the east parking lot, about a half-mile away from the vendors. The problem was that no one knew where they were. It took about an hour to finally find them, get the scooter, and get back to the show area. Lots of complaints over that.



We decided to visit the vendors first. There were in fact, 204 vendors, more than advertised. The first thing we did was look for the vendors offering raffle tickets for the engines. Tickets were free, all you needed to do was get one from each vendor and put your name and phone number on it before dropping it into the drum. Then we

realized if we wanted a tee-shirt, we needed to go to Dino's booth. When we got there, we saw seven lines of people, each with twenty or more people waiting to get tee-shirts. It took us the better part of an hour to get to the front of the line and some items were already sold out. But we did get our tee-shirts. We spent most of the remaining part of the day visiting the vendors and acquiring more tickets for the raffle engines. We did see a small portion of the trucks before we decided to cruise instead of walking. There were so many trucks trying to cruise that it became gridlock. It was getting close to the ends of the show for the day when we finally were able to get to an exit and leave the event.

On Saturday, they let all GM vehicles, cars and trucks of all years, in for the show. We got in a little easier than the day before, but cars and trucks kept coming all day. 17,000 parking spaces were reserved for this event, 9,000 of them for the entries. We parked in the same basic area as the day before and after acquiring the scooter for the day, we started going up and down rows to see the entries. Since the drawing for the LS motors was at noon, and winners had to be present or close enough to get there in five minutes, we headed that way arriving just in time for the drawings. We don't know how many tickets were in the drum, but the ticket drum was about ¾ full. One at a time, a winner was drawn, and three lucky and very happy guys came up to claim their win.

We spent a little more time looking at trucks and cars, but we were getting a little bit of overload by then. My I-Phone told me I had walked over 26,000 steps in two days, and I estimate we saw less than half of the vehicles. The show was over at three and by then we were on our way back to San Diego.



Dino announced there was close to 9,000 trucks in attendance and acknowledged there were a few things they needed to improve on. Dino also estimated about 60,000 spectators were in attendance. All in all, putting on an event of this magnitude took a huge number of workers and was a miraculous accomplishment. Dino's Git Down has set the standard for quality and magnitude of Chevy and GMC trucks at this

event. I can't imagine how many trucks will be coming to attend next year's show, but I am sure it will be even bigger than this year's show. If you like trucks, you would love this show.



First things first...

A big shoutout to Wayne Hartwig and Joe Keller for all their hard work in helping me get back on the road.

The Beginning; As I was leaving Valley Center heading to Escondido's Friday Night Cruising Grand, I started down the grade and from under the hood I heard a small ticking sound, hmmm, an exhaust leak:

Maybe a gasket would fix it? Well, wasn't all bad, fate was still smiling, and I topped off the night by winning the Cruising Grand Hot Spot award, Yippee.

Homeward bound the small ticking sound suddenly became a very disturbing CLATTERING. Okay, I've played this game before, the sound was probably rod/rocker arm failure. Same thing from 2013. I know, it's been 10 years, but having the repairs done is no picnic, no matter the frequency.

We had to start somewhere and the most intelligent thing to do was go to the source of that infernal CLATTERING. Removal of the D/S valve cover confirmed my fears, again the Rod/Rocker Arm #5 is misaligned and making the terrible racket. But there was no wearing on the rod, and only a slight nick on the rocker arm. The Nomad has fairly high mileage (over 112,000 miles), so it's also a good idea to check for possible collapsed lifters and maybe damage to the lifter plate along with the center plate and engine bolt (studs). To begin, the manifold had to be removed. That done, Wayne tested several of the lifters and could find no collapse or damage to any of the parts. From similar experiences, we pretty much knew what had to be done. We decided to replace a lifter, and the center plate along with the #5 rod/rocker arm, not to mention manifold gaskets and the v/c gasket. Wayne took the time to thoroughly and carefully examine the old lifter on which he found no wear and tear at all.

After a few days, the repairs were completed and I'm ready to hit the road again. Terrific, the sun is shining, the birds are singing, and the road ahead is mine. Not so fast, part II Nomad repair looms in the near future. October 7, Saturday, O' dark hundred. I left my warm bed early, met with some friends and fellow club members from the Drifters of So-Cal. and in the Nomad headed out toward Lake Elsinore to a car show in Canyon Lake. Canyon Lake is a city in South Riverside County, gated, patrolled and home to about 11,000 residents. It's pretty nice. It boasts a dam on the San Jacinto River, built in1927, which covers 383 acres and provides 17 miles of shoreline to the Canyon Lake residents. The 17th annual Canyon Lake Car Show is hosted by the Canyon Lake Car Club along with the Canyon Lake Property Owners Association, it's a pretty big deal and it seems like everyone is involved.

The show usually attracts hundreds of diverse vehicles, classics, rat rods, etc., as well as pre 1998 modern specialty cars. Also included in the show is the popular "Put a Jar in Your Car" a peanut butter drive for Helping Hands and needy seniors. As our group arrived, we met with other Drifters, and rolled on down to our specialty parking spot at the show. This year we were fortunate to be parked under the new, very large solar panel structures near the docks. These provide ample amounts of shade, fabulous an much needed in the 101-degree heat. This is October? The new nearby Lighthouse Restaurant with indoor and outdoor dining areas was open for breakfast and a lunch buffet in the afternoon along with adult beverages for a price \$\$\$\$. Some local food venders also offered a variety of food and fun treats.

The event was delightful with a DJ, the specialty vendors, raffles and a water ski demonstration. Parking was from 7-9 am and from 9-12, peer judging. Ron Hildebrand, better late than never, rolled in with his beautiful shiny red '57 Chevy. Because of the extreme heat, the award ceremony started earlier than planned. Many awards were provided from the Mayor's Award to BOS and many in between. I received an Award of Excellence for my 1950-59 class. After the show was over and we began to head home, I asked Rod if we could caravan. We were the only ones from down toward San Diego way.

Now, since the repairs had been completed the last week in September, the Nomad had been running smoothly and very well. My complacency was due for a dramatic about face. Rod and I were about to merge onto 15 south, Rod made the transition into the traffic lanes and off he went. Not so me. In the merge, I lost power (that's not a pleasant thing at ALL). I could not transition into the lanes to catch up to Rod, he's gone. I returned to the shoulder and coasted to a stop. The car was still running so I made another attempt to merge, but as soon as I put a load on the engine it would lose power. I'm stuck. Rod now misses me and calls to find out what happened. Explained the situation, and that by then several of the Drifters, Jim and Tina along with them. I told Rod to go on home, I knew I was in good hands.

Opening the hood, the problem was easily diagnosed – the fuel pressure gauge showed no fuel pressure, the engine was starving. I know there was plenty of fuel, having filled up the day before. Was it getting fuel to the carburetor but not enough to pull a load? Good night, not again! I just replaced the darn mechanical fuel pump three years ago, and THAT was fuel pump #3. I, however, sly and proactive person that I am, I have a backup plan – just in case. I had an electrical fuel pump installed, as I said – just in case. We decided the first thing to do was to get to a safe place. The closeness of 80mph freeway traffic is sometimes unnerving. I bypassed the mechanical fuel pump and accessed the electrical, turned it on and was running fine at a low rate of speed, yippee, made it to the next off ramp. Well, things are going pretty well, so let's try getting into traffic again. A hot rod in front and a daily driver behind, I'm thinking this is gonna be just fine. I pressed on the gas and NO GO! DONE! KAPUT! BOUGHT THE FARM! Rats, now it's time to really think about safety, not just mine, but for Jim and Tina as well. Let go get safe and think about calling for a rollback!

When JD and I were travelling, we always carried extra parts, including, but not limited to, a mechanical fuel pump. However, at this time, we didn't think under these circumstances it would have been of any help. And besides, the sun is drooping in the west, the clock is ticking along and it's probably not a good time to start a project 15 feet from maniacal freeway drivers. It may have all been in vain anyway. We limped along into Wildomar to a safe place. Jim and Tina Dickerson stayed with me until the rollback arrived and the Nomad was safely secured on top. A SPECIAL thank you to those who helped me from the Drifters and especially Jim and Tina Dickerson, all great people. We did make it home that night, late and tired, unloaded the Nomad and put it to bed in the garage. Then it was my turn, shower, beer, pj's and my glorious bed. It had been an extraordinarily busy and stressful day.

Troubleshooting debate is now underway, and it's all about OWNER'S MAINTENANCE RESPONSIBILITY!!!

Several questions came to mind. 1. Could it be another mechanical fuel pump failure? 2. When was the last time a fuel filter was replaced? Or, 3. I do recall replacing the fuel line to the carburetor in 05/18, but, hmmm, not the fuel filter? So many????. Who knew how long it had been, but I knew I had trouble when I couldn't answer the last one.







In the last newsletter, I mentioned JD's obsession with record and receipt keeping on the Nomad from day one. So, let's look in the "records". I could find none about fuel filter replacement. But, Aha! I did find a small cut out tag from a NAPA box with the lovely bold black letters #3052. Went to NAPA, they identified immediately that it was exactly the fuel filter I needed – no paranoia here, I bought 5.

Obvious conclusion, to wit: Replace mechanical fuel pump #4 (just for peace of mind), AND replace the bloody fuel filter, keeping extras in the car. Wayne, my "go to" guy was tied up on another scheduled repair, but I have been able to work with another great mechanic here in Valley Center. Chris has done limited, but similar, work on classics and was willing to do the work at my house – wowsa.

Since the passing of JD in 2019, I have relied heavily on others for guidance, as well as keeping the Nomad mechanically safe and sound for driving. I am fortunate to have so many friends and club members willing to take the time to help and increase my knowledge, as well. There is no way I can express the gratitude I feel for these absolutely fabulous, caring folks. Thank you so much.

END OF STORY: We replaced the mechanical fuel pump (Lucky #4) AND AND AND the FUEL FILTER. Now the pressure is up – hooray. We did a test drive over hill and dale for several miles, the pressure was just fine, no hiccups at all. I later dissected the fuel filter which had the appearance of an old whiskey barrel. It looked like I had been playing with it in a kindergarten SAND BOX for a very long time. The fuel pump diaphragms looked great, but after all this, we replaced them – just in case.

CONCLUSION: The Owner's Code of Responsibility. When changing the oil and oil filter, change the fuel filter as well!!! Doesn't cost much, is easy to do and will save you beau coup bucks, time, energy, and grief in the long haul.
