TECH TIMEThe Final Convertible Update - Plus 1

In December, I wrote a final update on my convertible project, but as it turns out, there would be a few more issues needing attention before the car could hit the road. Issue #1 was with the differential. I rebuilt the 3.45 ratio differential with all new bearings and seals and had it setup correctly. While it was whisper quiet on acceleration, it was quite noisy on deceleration. When the car came home from upholstery, I pulled the differential out of the car and took it to Kraig at Pro Gear to have him take a look. He said it looked good to him too. So, it was his opinion that perhaps the gears were worn just enough to be noisy. Kraig had an information sheet from Dana Differentials and saw that new gear sets for this differential were available in three ratios, 3.36, 3.55, and 3.73. He asked Dana about the 3.45 ratio and was told it was only available for a short time because it was somewhat problematic and therefore discontinued. So a new set of 3.55 ratio gears was ordered. The old gear set was originally secured to the carrier with 3/8 bolts and the new gears were designed for 7/16 bolts, meaning the old carrier would need to be drilled out to the larger bolt size. With that completed and the differential reassembled, I reinstalled the differential in the car. A short test drive revealed that all was now good with the differential, quiet under all conditions. Wahoo! One more big item off the list.

Issue #2 was identified during the test drive after completing issue #1. The car started and ran great but would only go about two or three mile before it would go into "RPM Reduction Mode" or as some call it, "Limp Mode." When I plugged my scan tool into the data link connector, it indicated that everything was okay. I decided then to take the car to Certified Car Clinic in Lakeside where they have the correct computer software and data link connector to see all the readings to verify what was happening. It revealed that the engine temperature was just hot enough to cause RPM Reduction. Further investigation revealed the radiator fans were running. however the air passing through the radiator was coming out much colder than it should. This was really a mystery, because this same radiator was in the car from the beginning and had gone over 2,000 miles before disassembling the car for paint. I could see there had to be a problem but didn't know what. I removed the radiator and looked to see what could be causing the problem. It looked good to me. But I decided to take it to the radiator shop and have them take a look. To them, the problem was obvious. This radiator is a double-crossflow design, meaning the inlet and outlet are both on the same side of the radiator. There is a baffle halfway down the tank that makes the coolant flow across the top half, then down and back across the bottom half. The only problem was that the baffle was not there and apparently never was. So, the coolant went in the top and right out the bottom back to the engine without being cooled. Effectively, the car had been running without a radiator.

You may be wondering how the car could run for 2,000 miles without going into RPM Reduction Mode and why now it was. I don't know the answer to that question for sure, but I suspect it has something to do with the coolant. Before, the system was filled with 50% anti-freeze and 50% water. I filled it with Evans Coolant this time and Evans Coolant runs about 10 degrees hotter than anti-freeze and water.

I suspect the engine was running on the hot side before, but not hot enough for the RPM Reduction to kick in, but that extra 10 degrees or so must have pushed it over the limit. In a way, I feel lucky the problem surfaced now before it caused any permanent damage to the engine down the road.

After re-installing the radiator, I test drove the car for 15 to 20 miles a couple times and there were no more issues with RPM Reduction. In fact, it ran great! Just in time to participate in the Everett Shackelton drive-by cruise in Santee that was arranged by the Over The Hill Gang. Yes, the first official outing in public for the convertible was on January 16, while paying respects to a fellow gear head who left us too soon. Because of the fast pace of moving cars and other pandemic restrictions, I don't think anyone was able to see the car up close. I hope to get it back out there somewhere again soon.

We have been attending the annual "Streak" car show sponsored by the Over The Hill Gang (OTHG) for over 20 years. This is the four-day show at Campland on the Bay held every year on Mother's day weekend. If you have ever attended this event, you know how much fun it is. We have been camping out for the entire show every year and have enjoyed all of the events, especially the large raffles, the great food, the entertainment, the poker walks and of course, all the wonderful people from OTHG.

During that time we have made many friends in the OTHG. Among these friends were Everett Shackelton and his wife Sue. Over the years we have seen Everett and his wife at many car shows and events in their 1934 Ford Everett has owned since he was 17 years old. Several months ago Everett was diagnosed with Leukemia. His 80th birthday wish was to have the biggest and grandest Street Rod Drive-By Cruise that San Diego County has ever seen.

The members of OTHG arranged to do an 80th Birthday Drive-By Cruise for Everett on January 16 and they invited numerous car clubs to participate. The cars were to be staged in a school parking lot just down the street from the Shackelton residence. The parking lot was not big enough to hold all of the cars that came to honor Everett. They overflowed out onto the street and around the corner, each one ready to drive-by and wave to the Shackelton family. Sadly, Everett passed a couple days before the cruise was to take place. However, that did not deter anyone from showing up with their hot rods and classic cars to one-by-one pass by the residence to wave and talk to the family. It was difficult to get an exact number, but I believe there were well over 200 vehicles lined up to cruise by the residence in Santee in support of Everett's wishes.

I don't have an exact number of Classic Chevys and Tri-Five Revolution cars that participated in the drive-by because there were so many cars spread out through the parking lot and on the streets, it was difficult to see them all. I saw at least nine and perhaps there were more.

29th Annual Midnight at the Oasis

YUMA, AZ, JANUARY 2020 --- The Caballeros de Yuma are saddened to announce the cancellation of the 2021 Midnight at the Festival. For the first time since the inception of the event, Midnight at the Oasis will not be held in 2021. While the planning of the event had been ongoing, the pressures of the increased cases of COVID-19 in the state and surrounding areas have put the Caballeros in a situation where the event must be cancelled. "While every indication showed that our patrons, entrants and sponsors were behind our efforts to hold the event in March, we decided it would be prudent at this time to safeguard everyone's health," said Travis Smith, chairman of the event. "We determined that cancelling the event for this year is the right thing to do to avoid contributing to the coronavirus spike that currently has given the State of Arizona the highest infection rate in the world." One aspect of Midnight at the Oasis that everyone looks forward to is the car raffle. The 1937 Ford Humpback set for raffle this year is temporarily on hold. The raffle will take place at a later date. Please look for updates on social media and our website.

The Caballeros de Yuma held two events in November and proved that returning to live events safely was possible. The organization went to great lengths to safeguard the health and safety of guests at those events. While plans were underway for the March event with extensive measures in place, the uncertainty related to the coronavirus pandemic led to the decision to cancel. Mr. Smith also stated that "we appreciate the support we have received from the City of Yuma regarding this decision. We were widely praised for the safety protocols we put in place for our recent fall events, and we wanted to be able to provide patrons and participants the same safe environment and great Caballeros de Yuma experience during Midnight at the Oasis, but with the restrictions in place and the sheer size of the event we determined it would be best interest of the safety of the community, the entrants, and the patrons to cancel the event given the current risk to all".

The annual car show attracts nearly 1000 cars from all around the Southwest to Yuma, AZ. With up to 30,000 patrons throughout the weekend it is easily one of the largest events in the Desert Southwest. With a show and shine held daily Friday through Sunday, and concerts held Friday and Saturday night, the annual event is beloved by many throughout our community. Annual donations to organizations that help assist the Caballeros de Yuma during the event topped \$85,000 in 2020 just before the pandemic hit. It is also many of our non-profit food providers largest fundraiser each year. The loss of this event this year will be tough on many.

El Presidente for the Caballeros de Yuma, Rodney Short, stated "we had hoped that all the challenges of 2020 would have been behind us by now, but with the recent surge and delays in the vaccine, 2021 is not getting any easier. We hoped to give our community another great event as the Caballeros always do, but with the restrictions required to hold an event at this time, we felt we would be doing a disservice to our patrons, participants and sponsors if we were to try and hold the event." The Caballeros wish to again thank all of our past sponsors for Midnight at the Oasis. Without them Midnight at the Oasis could not be held annually for our community. The Caballeros de Yuma's plan will be to come back with a version of Midnight at the Oasis in 2022 that you will not want to miss.

Currently, the Caballeros de Yuma have no plans to alter the rest of their 2021 schedule, which includes the Annual Yuma Territory Marathon and Half-marathon on January 30th, the Bull of the Desert Strongman event on February 13th, Flag Raising Ceremony on July 4th and Tacos and Tunes on September 24th and 25th. Rod Shows, producer of the Grand National Roadster Show and Sacramento Autorama, has canceled both events scheduled to be held in 2021. The events will return in 2022.




