We made plans several months ago with Mike & Pat Harvey to drive our classics to Texas to attend Lonestar XXXI, a Tri-Five Chevy Convention co-sponsored by five Texas Tri-Five Chevy Clubs. Every year the show is hosted by a different club and moves to a different Texas location. This year the show was going to be in San Angelo on Memorial Day weekend.



Unfortunately, Mike & Pat were not able to get their classic in time, but they decided to go with us in their pickup. We left San Diego early on a Thursday morning to make the three-day trek. It was already getting warm before we made it through El Cajon and by the time we met Mike & Pat in El Centro, it was in the low 90's. By the time we made Yuma, it was 101 degrees. Not to worry, Little Brownie handled the heat just fine and we cruised right on into the Hampton Inn in Tucson where we stopped for the night.





The next day, we continued east on I-10. Temps were in the mid 90's and we were just cruising along enjoying the scenery, that is, until we were 20 miles west of Las Cruces. At first we just noticed a little unidentified intermittent vibration, but shortly thereafter there was a whole lot of shaking going on and it was not the good kind. We pulled off the road to check it out. Wow, the right rear tire had separated and was now sporting a watermelon size knob! A few minutes later, we had the spare bolted on the car and we headed for the nearest Discount Tire store in Las Cruces.

The folks at Discount Tire first said the exact same tire was in stock, but it was not to be. In fact, there were no stores anywhere from Las Cruces to San Angelo that could help us out, so we needed a new plan. After looking at a couple different options, neither of which was satisfactory to us, the manager made us an offer we couldn't refuse. First, he contacted the Store Manager in San Angelo and had him order the tires we needed, which would take a couple days, as the tires had to come from Phoenix. He then put two tires on the car that would get us safely to San Angelo. When we arrived in San Angelo, the store there would trade-out those two tires for the ones we needed. It couldn't get much better than that!

We had lunch at Chili's next door while they installed the tires and we were back on the road again, just in time for heavy commute traffic through El Paso. By the time we arrived at the Hampton in New Horn Texas, we had also passed through two time zones and it was almost 10 p.m. local time.

The third day was much shorter, both in time and mileage. Before we hit the road, we received a call from the San Angelo Discount Tire Manger advising us our tires had arrived and were waiting for us. Really? Overnight? Fantastic! Temps were still in the mid 90's and clouds were increasing. The humidity level was climbing and it was getting a little breezy, but all in all it was a nice drive the rest of the way. Apparently, classic cars in New Mexico & Texas don't get driven all that much. Every time we stopped for gas or food, there was a swarm of people around the car, telling their stories about the one they used to have. The comment heard most often was "I can't believe you drove this car all the way from California!" We arrived at the Clarion Hotel in San Angelo around 4 pm. A few Texas plated classics had already arrived. We checked into our rooms, and then headed for Discount Tire. Sure enough, the tires were there and just as they were locking the doors for the day, the new tires were on the car and we were ready to check out the town and find a good dinner spot. If you are ever in San Angelo, try the Original Henry's Mexican Restaurant. It is Tex-Mex style food and it is awesome.

That night, Mike & Pat taught us how to play Five Crowns, another fun card game, and then we were ready to call it a day. Around 10 p.m., we started to hear thunder & lightning, and then it started to rain heavy. It rained six inches overnight, but by morning, the rain stopped and the parking lot was drying up. It was a beautiful day and time to clean up the car, which went quite fast with Mike's expert help in removing bugs from all of the forward facing surfaces. Thanks Mike, great job!

By mid-morning, more classics had arrived, but it seemed like a small number overall. Registration opened at noon and it seemed like we were the only ones ready to check in. We met Mike King, President of the Concho Classic Chevy Club, host of this year's show. Mike told us they only had 33 pre-registered cars, but were hoping for at least 50.



Apparently, most of the Lonestar shows draw 150 to 200 classics, but San Angelo is kind out of the way, in fact, it's not on the way to anywhere. The only reason anyone goes to San Angelo is if that's where they really want to go. The threat of bad weather kept a few away too. One of the first things we learned was there was a parking garage a couple blocks away where they reserved parking in case there was a threat of hail. Fortunately, Mother Nature was cooperative and we did not have to take advantage of this option.



Saturday was the day of the Show N' Shine and the weather was again very nice. Counting a couple of Ford trucks and a few other non-classics, there were a total of 48 vehicles. There was no real judging of cars. They pick a Best Interior, Best Engine and Best Paint, and award every entrant a commemorative plague. That way no one goes home empty handed and there is more time for everyone to hang out in the parking lot visiting with everyone else. Everyone we met was extremely nice and welcomed us from California as well as a couple with a baby from Australia. The Australian couple, who are building a '57 sedan, shared a lot of interesting facts about how things are done down under, like how much more expensive it is to buy or build a classic and how modification of a car requires an application detailing the changes and an inspection when the work is complete.





Many of the classics at the show were more of very nice driver quality than all-out show. A few were gorgeous new build cars and some were unrestored originals. Some were hot rods with high horsepower engines and some were mostly stock in appearance. They were all fun to see. We took a lot of photos, shared stories, and had a good time. By 2 p.m., the show was winding down and we headed out to find lunch.

The awards dinner started at 7 p.m. They served a buffet style dinner of beef brisket, chicken, salad, rolls and chocolate cake for dessert. After dinner, Mike King got right to the awards. There were a few door prizes and they announced the special awards. One of those was the long-distance award, which was \$100 cash going to that couple who drove their classic all the way from San Diego to San Angelo. Right after the awards, a DJ played classic oldies, attracting some of us to get out on the dance floor. Even Elvis and Priscilla made an appearance.







MORE ON HYDROGEN PEROXIDE MAGIC

Part 1

Ever since I started using Hydrogen Peroxide to get rid o...f armpit stains, to clean cookie sheets, as a miracle cleaner in my kitchen and bathroom, and to make my own "oxi clean"...I ALWAYS have at least one bottle of the stuff under my kitchen sink, under my bathroom sink, AND in the laundry room. In the dishwasher, add 2 oz. to your regular detergent for a sanitizing boost. Also, beef up your regular dish soap by adding roughly 2 ounces of 3% H2O2 to the bottle.



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




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
