# Cruisin' Morro Bay submitted by Wayne & Linda

We have been trying to attend some new car show venues, so when the Harvey's told us they wanted to make the run to Morro Bay on May 4 through 7 for the annual Cruisin' Morro Bay car show, we were all in and so were the Hildebrand's. Morro Bay is a small town of about 10,000 people on the California Coast a few miles west of San Luis Obispo. The town's most striking feature is Morro Rock, a 576-foot high volcanic plug, which stands at the entrance to the harbor.

We met at the Rest Area north of Oceanside in our three T5R classics at 9 am on Thursday morning and headed north on the I-5 for a short 300-mile ride. The weather was great and the traffic good except for normal slowing on parts of the I-405. We made a gas stop in Encino and a lunch stop at Olive Garden in Ventura while making our way to the Sandpiper Inn in Morro Bay, arriving around 4:30.



After checking into our rooms and a quick cleaning of the cars, we cruised down the street in our classics three blocks to the Ocean View Garage for the early registration. There were

other car show entrants coming and going as we pulled in to park. In the lobby,

there were antique fuel pumps and other cool things to see. There were classic cars and hot rods back in the garage area, but it was closed off at the time. We completed our registration, collected our t-shirt and had some snack type food before heading back to the Sandpiper for some Five Crowns.





Friday morning arrived a little bit on the foggy side. We had breakfast at the Hungry Fisherman before staging our classics at the church for the cruise to Ragged Point, 43 miles north on Highway 1. There were approximately 150 cars lined up for the cruise that left promptly at 11 am. The Harvey's decided to visit Cambria instead of going to Ragged Point, so it was the

Hildebrand's and us. Since the road was closed just past Ragged Point due to a collapsed bridge, most of the traffic was cars participating in the cruise. It was still a little foggy at ragged point when we arrived, but it quickly burned off leaving us with some spectacular views of the area. There were several places to eat, buy souvenirs, etc., After exploring the area and getting a sandwich for lunch, we decided to head back to Morro Bay with a cruise through Cambria and a stop at a couple antique stores where Linda found a few 45 rpm records for her collection. With the fog now gone, we could see a lot more of the area, including elephant seals on the beach and Hearst Castle on top of the mountain.

By the time we made the trip back to Morro Bay, we had time for a bite to eat at a local Pizza place before it was time for the Friday night cruise through the streets of Morro Bay. At 5 pm, the local authorities blocked off the streets and cars were lined up two lanes wide. Cameras were setup on the ground and on a drone to video the cars making clockwise laps around a 14-block loop. At 6 pm, the cruise was



kicked off with numerous antique police cars, a fire truck and a 70's era Cadillac hearse followed by a whole lot of classics and hot rods. Open headers and loud pipes were everywhere. Burnouts were prohibited, but there were a few that just could not resist the temptation. After the first lap, some cars were randomly selected to pull over for a short interview with the driver to be included in the DVD of the event to be sold to participants for \$20. At the beginning of lap two, Rod was picked for a quick interview on camera and he represented T5R well. We had the option to keep going as long as we wanted or park along the route on side streets. We opted to park half way through lap two so we could take advantage of the free root beer floats from the A&W truck before having dinner at Kitty's Kitchen across the street. Then it was back to the Sandpiper for more Five Crowns.

There were other activities taking place, but it was difficult to participate in all of them. There was a treasure hunt where you needed to collect stamps from 23 different businesses located in the downtown area. Those who were successful in collecting all 23 stamps were eligible for a drawing to win one of 14 baskets of goodies. There was also a second annual car show at the High School celebrating the grand opening of their new Auto Shop on Friday at 1 pm. Because we chose to make the cruise to Ragged Point, we opted out of these activities.



Saturday was the all day show and shine covering about 18 blocks of city streets. Parking was allowed starting at 5 am. Apparently, most entrants actually set alarms to get up by 5 am, park in their chosen spaces, then go back to bed. We did not. However, at 7 am, we cruised two blocks down the street from the Sandpiper and quickly found three spaces together just one block from the official's booth where all the action takes place. Life was good!

The weather was nice until around 9 am when the breeze started blowing and by 10 am it was really blowing and it was cold. We spent most of the day walking around looking at all of the 530 cars on display of which 43 were Tri-Five Chevys. We did not see even one Tri-Five convertible and only a couple Nomads. Most were two-door sedans or hardtops. There were speakers located on every block providing music and information throughout the day. We took time for breakfast at Kitty's Kitchen and spent



most of our time looking at cars. We spent very little time sitting by our cars, as the cold wind made it a little uncomfortable.



Saturday awards are usually presented a 4 pm, but because of the weather, the time was moved up to 3 pm. The wind was dying down some by then as we sat near the official booth in our chairs for the awards ceremony. This show gives out a lot of trophies, but not for any specific thing. They are Awards of Distinction picked by sponsors who just pick cars they like rather than judging them for quality. Even so, most winning cars were very worthy of the award. Rod & Nancy were winners of one of the glass plate awards picked by the Event Chairman for the cruise, quite an honor.



In order to promote more participation on Sunday, there are also awards for the Sunday portion of the car show. We were told there are usually around 150 cars on Sunday, filling about 8 blocks of streets. But this year it was raining and there were only about 30 cars in a short 1-block area. The one o'clock awards were presented early at 11 am at which time the rain had temporarily subsided. All three of our T5R classics were awarded a trophy.

It looked like the rain was moving south, so we decided to head south too, chasing the rain away in front of us. We did get a couple of little showers south of Santa Maria, but by the time we made it to the IN 'N Out in Santa Barbara, it was sunny and nice. A look at the weather forecast showed some serious rain south of Long Beach for the night and early morning, so the Harvey's and the Hartwig's opted to stay at the Holiday Inn Express at Ventura Harbor for the night. The Hildebrand's opted to keep driving for home. We will let Rod tell you how that went.

We had a nice dinner at Milano's Italian Restaurant at the Harbor and played a few games of Five Crowns, then retired for the night. The drive home on Monday was non-eventful with a stop at "The Hat" at the Lake Forest exit for one of their world famous pastrami sandwiches. We arrived home around 2:30.

Morro Bay is a really nice little town with very friendly people. There are lots of one-of-a-kind stores to explore and places to eat. The show is well planned and coordinated with numerous choices of events to participate in. Despite the less than perfect weather, we had a really good time. We have decided we liked the show enough to go back again next year and have already made our hotel reservations. Come join us!

### The Kitchen Scoop on a Delicious Salad

Challenged with providing the salad for a French-inspired meal, and wanting something more inspired that a collection of frilly greens and dressing, I looked through several recipes on line before settling on this sweet corn and radish salad. The combination of fresh corn, a large quantity of radishes, sweet red pepper, black olives, fresh herbs and a mixture of baby lettuces in a homemade dressing is delicious. I hope you'll give it a try.

#### Sweet Corn and Radish Salad

Serves 4



3 ears fresh corn

3/4 cup sliced radishes, preferably mild-flavored ones

1 sweet red pepper diced

1/4 cup pitted black olives, sliced

1/8 cup fresh parsley, snipped

1/8 cup fresh chives, snipped

1 teaspoon crushed dried tarragon

2 cups mixed red and green letteuces, torn into bite sized pieces.

#### Dressing:

1 clove garlic, mashed salt and freshly ground black pepper

1 Tablespoon rice vinegar

1/2 teaspoon prepared mustard

2-3 dashes hot red pepper sauce

3 Tablespoons extra virgin olive oil

1 Tablespoon water

Cook the corn. Quickly cool shucked ears in a bowl of ice water. Cut kernels from the cobs and place in a large bowl adding radishes, diced red pepper, and sliced olives. Mix herbs together; sprinkle over all. Add torn salad greens. Toss to mix.

Blend garlic, salt and pepper by rubbing together with the back of a spoon in a small bowl. Add remaining dressing ingredients whisking together until emulsified. Pour over salad just prior to serving. Toss to coat.







