Three days later they would return home, victorious, as two of their group of seven classic cars were part of a select twelve out of over 950 entrants to gain recognition for excellence. Midnight at the Oasis is at the top of a lot of hard-to-beat car show lists. In it's nineteenth year, it's grown from an initial 18 classic cars to 1,000 registrants. This year's MATO provided an opportunity to enjoy a drive-in movie double feature, fun (poker) runs, a parade well attended by townsfolk, a day long show-and-shine, large array of vendor booths, and two evening concerts. For this weekend, in Yuma, classic cars rule.











Organized by the Caballeros de Yuma, the event is supported by numerous local groups from 4-H'ers to sports clubs, all of whose efforts earn them a share of the proceeds. Your entry fee not only gets you lots of fun, but also lots of good food -- a Friday reception supper, Saturday lunch and Sunday brunch. All of these are best followed by peach cobbler baked in cast iron Dutch ovens over coals and purchased from the local Boy Scouts. For those, like me, into true decadence, cobbler should always be topped with vanilla soft-serve from the neighboring vendor.















Congratulations to Sam and Donna. Their beautiful black '57 Nomad brought home this year's "Easy Living" award. And to Rod and Nancy Hildebrand whose bright red '57 was deemed "Hottest" ride.

This show is an annual sell out. Entries for the 20th Midnight at the Oasis must be postmarked April 01, a month earlier than usual. T5R will be entering as a group for the first time in 2012. The part of the bearing that contacts the spindle had welded itself on and had to be removed with a cut off wheel and a 3 pound hammer.



With the old bearing off, the spindle was dressed with a file and emery cloth.

PSG Wafer Leak - Confrol Valve Sfory by Ron Foote

As most small projects go, this was to be a really simple one. What's the big deal about replacing the power control valve on the power steering? It was well thought out, talked to club members who had spare parts, so all I had to do was rebuild it and then replace my worn out part.

When Annette and I moved the '56 to center it in the garage to have space on both sides for the hydraulic jack, there before our eyes was a puddle of anti-freeze. "Crap" was the first word that came to mind. Upon further inspection I found that the top of the radiator was leaking. I needed to pull the radiator and have it re-soldered. BUT, in order to pull it I first had to pull the fan because of clearance issues. Fan won't come off because of clearance issues. I had to pull the water pump and fan as a unit. Well, might as well replace the water pump with a new one. Then I decided to replace that leaky oil seal on the timing chain cover while I had everything apart. Yep, you guessed it, the timing chain needed to be replaced. Our car happens to have the old style Corvette front motor mounts and because I had to remove it to take the timing cover off I might as well replace the old rubber mounts. Of course you have to clean and paint anything and everything you touch. Ten days later I finished fixing the coolant leak. Bob Bishop was kind enough to loan me a harmonic balancer puller and installer. Removing went well but, when I went to reinstall it my crankshaft did not have any threads in the end. I had to beat it on the old fashioned way!!

Now this is not the end of the story, I still needed to fix my original problem, the power steering control valve. I have to say this was a really easy project. Bob had an old one and a rebuild kit for it. All I had to do was clean; paint, rebuild it and then swap it out. Five days to do it, 2 days off because of the snow and cold. The moral to this story is to give yourself plenty of time to complete your project as something always goes wrong working on a car that is almost as old as me.
