The car show season for 2025 is just beginning and it usually starts off for us with the Grand National Roadster Show in Pomona. This year would be different. We learned about a car show right here in San Diego at the Naval Medical Hospital in Balboa Park. It was part of the 12th Annual Invincible Spirit Festival with Gary Sinise and the Lt. Dan Band in the parking lot in front of the Naval Medical Center. Interestingly, the show was free and so was all of the food and drinks. The catch is that you have to be active or retired military with access to the Navy Base to attend the car show. For those who have never been in the military, approval for base access can be approved for

the show but must be requested at least three weeks in advance. It was less than three weeks when we heard about the show, but being a retired Navy Veteran, we were able to get approved.

On the morning of the show, we left home at 7:30 am and made our way to the Naval Medical



Center. It had been many years since I have been there, and using GPS was really handy getting us there without getting lost. When we arrived at 8:00 am, the parking lot was already 2/3rd full of show cars. The sun was up, and it was

warming up quite nicely becoming a perfect Chamber of Commerce day. We parked in an open space and made sure the car show ready. Festivities didn't officially start until 11:00 am, but volunteer workers were everywhere setting up popups, tables & chairs, and some were already busy cooking hamburgers, hot dogs and chicken. We made our way around the car show area and saw that there were numerous port-a-potties in several areas, and big plastic tubs full of ice, sodas and water were being setup in numerous places around the cars and vendors. Other volunteers were busy getting the stage setup for the bands. Vendors were setting up and we were surprised to see Simple Green was there and would be giving away samples of their products when the festivities started.

By 11:00 am, when things got underway, there were 132 classics in the car show area and the opening band, "Stolen Silver" was playing music. Bounce houses, face painters, balloon artists and a rock climbing wall were all busy with hundreds of people who came to enjoy the day. The food lines were opened, and people were making their way through the lines to fill their plates with hamburgers, hot dogs, chicken, potato salad, macaroni salad, watermelon, and cookies for dessert.



"I grew up in Anaheim, Calif. and during my junior I grew up in Anaheim, Calif. and during my jun high school and high school years I learned to sur Sam Rindskopf said. "I spent every weekend durin the school year and weekdays during the summer the beach surfing with my friends. Of course, in it sixties surfing in Southern California was all the rape."

Rindskopf, #2793 of Temecula, Calif. needed a station wagon in those days to safely haul surfboards ranging in length from nine to ten feet to the beach. "Woodies became the cool surf wagon to own."

Rindskopf said. "However, in my opinion Nomads were the cream of the crop surf wagon and I dreamed of owning one someday."

His love for Nomads grew even stronger when a student at his high school built a tilf front end 327 powered red 1957 Nomad.
"That was the baddest car in our school and I loved it," Rindskopf said. "In those days I would have been happy to own any wagon. I settled for a four-door 1957 Plymouth, and with the back seat removed my nine foot Jacobs surfboard fit. That was my first car, I got my \$50 worth out of it with all those trips to Huntington Beach."
Fast forward many years after marrying his wife, Donna, serving a stint in the U.S. Air Force, having four daughters, getting a bachelors and masters degree in mechanical engineering, and sending their daughters off to college, he and his wife agreed it may 6 Noma Post

be time to get a classic car. By this time in their lives, they had left Southern California, spent 10 years living in Las Vegas and were now living in Shreveport, La.

"One day on my way to a doctor's appointment I passed a classic car lot and a 1955 Nomad caught my eye," Rindskopf said. "Unfortunately, the '55 had been pretty butchered up over the years and was going to take a significant investment just to make it reasonable to drive."

Rindskopf talked with his wife about the car and told her that if they ever found a 57 Nomad, he would buy it.

"A few months later, while passing the lot, I spotted a tropical turquoise and white 1957 Nomad." Rindskopf said. "I stopped and looked the car over and headed home to discuss buying it with my wife. The couple returned to the lot and after test driving the Nomad, decided to make an offer. "After some serious negotiations we drove that beauty home." Rindskopf said.

The paint on the turquoise 1957 Nomad was a little oxidized but aside from that, the body was straight and seemed in pretty good condition with no obvious signs of rust. A good work over with the buffer and polishing compound brought the paint back to life, so much so that the salesman who sold the car to the Rindskopfs thought they had it painted.

The interior had been replaced and was also in



good condition.
The Nomad needed some mechanical work which they noticed after their first road trip to the Classic Chevy's Winter nationals in Kissimmee, Fla. They learned that the bias ply tires, heavy rain on the interstate and worn-out ball joints provided for more excite

provided for more excitement than they wanted.
"The bias ply tires went into the dumpster as soon as we returned from home," Rindskopf said. "With new Coker wide white wall radials mounted our attention turned to rebuilding the entire front suspension, which I did myself, with Donna lending a hand Donna lending a hand when needed."

when needed."

They removed all the chrome including the bumpers and sent it all off to be re-plated. The stainless trim was in reasonable shape, so they left it alone. Once they got the new chrome installed, and the front end reworked they. end reworked, they began attending local car shows and met fellow Nomaders Ed and Mary

Nomaders Ed and Mary Robertson.
"I remember asking Ed if his Nomad tailgate leaked," Rindskopf said. "He responded with a question for us. 'Does your Nomad leak?' I said yes. Ed then replied, "Then you know it's a Nomad."

nia. "As luck would have it "As luck would have it the Chevrolet Nomad Association was having their annual convention in Sedona, Ariz. and our moving plans aligned perfectly." Rindskopf said. "With all our household belongings packed up and on their way to San Diego, we loaded the Nomad into our car Nomad into our car trailer and headed to Sedona to attend our very first Nomad Con-vention. We had a blast there and met a group of folks from San Diego, among them were Dana and J.D. Stevens. We Nomad into our car

became great friends."

from our homes,"
Rindskopf said. "A short
time later we received
another call from them
informing us that the
winds had shifted again
and that they had been
ordered to evacuate."
The neighbors went to
the Rindskopf home and
graphed their two cats from our hon

grabbed their two cats and headed for safety. and headed for safety. When the Rindskopfs arrived at the bottom of the hill to go up to Ramona, there were road-blocks. Searching for an alternative route, they found another roadblock. "Unable to return to our home we headed to retrieve our cats," Rindskopf said. "We decided to head to my

The next morning, the Rindskopfs received a phone call from a neighbor informing them that their home had burned

to the ground.
"We lost everything except the clothes on our back and the car we were driving," Rindskopf said. "Our beautiful 1957

driving," Rindskopf said.
"Our beautiful 1957
Nomad was now a crumpled piece of charred metal. I could not even bring myself to look at it for weeks after the fire."
They began the process of dealing with the insurance company, with the adjuster calling almost daily to ask how they were doing on a list of everything they had lost inside their home that they were creating. "Many times, we would start working on our list and breakdown into tears remembering something that brought back very special memories," Rindskopf said. "It was during one of these emotional moments that we decided to replace our Nomad, and I began to search. We both agreed that it had to be another 1957."
The Rindskopfs discov-

The Rindskopfs discovered a 1957 Nomad, and upon investigation, they liked what they saw and

We had a Nomad "We had a Nomad friend come and help us inspect the car," Rindskopf said. "We knew it needed some work but didn't realize how much work until we got it home and began to look more closely at it."

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The Rindskopfs began fixing the 1957 Nomad up, doing things they could do in the rental house garage with only a set of hand tools.

"Whenever, the stress from everything would doverwhelm Donna and I, we would head to the garage and work on our new Nomad project," Rindskopf said. "We focused on making the car safe and drivable." The front suspension was upgraded with a 500 care.

was upgraded with a 500 steering box, tubular A-arms, new coil springs - trimmed a bit to lower

- trimmed a bit to lower the car to a nice ride height, new side motor mounts and disc brakes - front and rear.

A Be Cool radiator system made specifically for a 1957 Chevy was installed.

"Now the car was safe to drive and we began to go to local car shows, which was a great way to forget about the fire and our loss," Rinkskopf said, As time went on, they

"It was a fun time collaborating on the design and took our mind off our loss," Rindskopf said. "George did a fantastic job on the interior, it was far nicer than we had ever dreamed possible. After stripping the cardown, George discovered the floor pans were rusted and replaced



them.

He installed motorized console doors, motorized door covering the storage behind the backseat, power door locks, power windows and wind wings, Dakota Digital gauges with cruise control, blitel dash and AC vents, three-point seat

power windows and wind wings, Dakota Digital gauges with cruise control, billet dash and AC vents, three-point seat belts and blue LED lighting.
"Now we had a problem, as the the interior was far nicer than the rest of the car, so we decided to do a frame off restoration," Rindskopf said. "Since, all my shop equipment was lost in the fire, I turned to friends for help."

The new 1957 Nomad was completely disassembled, with every nut and bolt removed. The body was put on a rented rotisserie, cleaning up the frame and adding front and rear sway bars, traction bars, new motor mounts and a mount for the rear shocks.

The Chevy 12 bolt posi-traction rear end was rebuilt with a set of 355 gears, sending the reworked frame out for powder coating along with the suspension components. For the body, the firewall was smoothed and inner fender panels fabricated to hide all the wiring and the fan controlier. The body fenders, hood, doors, and tailgate were sent to Benny's Auto Body in San Diego where it was stripped to bare metal and all the Bondo, rust and dents were removed. Multiple coats of single stage black ure than epain was applied.

bare metal and all the bollod, just and currethane paint was applied.

At the same time, all the chrome parts were re-chromed and all the stainless trim was polished. "My friend Wayne Hartwig taught me how to properly polish the stainless," Rindskopf said. "I spent many hours working on my buffer to get each of the many pieces of stainless polished to perfection."

Stainless steel button head bolts were used wherever possible along with stainless steel brake and fuel lines, all of which Rindskopf polished.

Many aftermarket upgrade parts were added to the build, like a Raingear wiper motor and linkage, an Iddit steering column, billet hood hinge, Billet hood braces, Billet vintage air frontrunner system, Billet valve covers and air cleaner, Billet tong thinge, Billet will pares, Billet dash trim, Billet dash knobs, gas struts for the lift gate, and more.

A GM.72.383, 425 horsepower crate motor, a 4L60e transmission, a torque converter and an aluminum drive shaft was installed to go along with the Chevy 12 bolt rear end.

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"I purchased several sets of exhaust headers searching for a pair that would mate up properly to the engine and tuck up tightly under the car," Rindskopf said. "I finally went with a custom set which worked perfectly. I purchased three inch stainless steel Magnaflow X exhausts. Boy, they were stoth fir."

All new glass was installed in the 1957Nomad and

reassembled just in time to take it to Hot August
Nights in Reno, Nev.
"Since completing the Nomad we have attended
two western Nomad Conventions and are planning
on attending many more," Rindskopf said. "We really
enjoy driving and showing our car and have put the

All entries have to be in place by 9:00 am when the spectator gates open, and vehicles are not allowed to move until after the awards ceremony at 3:00 pm. We picked up our goody bag, filled out our window placard and took the bottom tear-off section to the tee-shirt booth, trading it in for the event tee-shirt. The presentation of the American flag and the National Anthem were presented at 10:00 am.

We then made our way to all of the vendors and eventually up and down most of the rows of entries. We never did make it up and down every row. When it was time for lunch, we perused the numerous food vendors and decided on a hot dog and an ice cream cone.

Time flew by and soon it was 2:00 pm and time for the trophy presentation. The winning vehicles were identified with red, white and blue ribbons and were lined up to be paraded in front of the stage on the concourse. There weren't very many awards for a show of this size. There were no award categories. Judges picked the "Top Ten" entries and around twenty-five other awards were chosen sponsors. The Big Bear Lake Antique Car Club invites you to attend the 34th Annual Fun Run car show August 8 – 10, 2025, in the Big Bear Lake Village. We welcome return and new entrants to the premier spectator event in Big Bear Lake.

Online entries open March 1. This year we're opening at 7 AM instead of midnight so that our web master and I can be available to handle any problems. Entry fee is still \$65 per car. \$70 on day of event. The car show is free to spectators. Show is open from 9 AM to 3:30 PM on Saturday. There will be about 500 cars on display representing classic and exotic cars.

We will again have an exotic car category for exotics of specified vintage. Exotic cars will be parked together (required) at a special location in the Village. Acceptable exotic cars listed on our website. Note there are some changes from last year.

Cars will be on display on Pine Knot, Village Drive, Bartlett street, and Bartlett parking lot. The streets in the Village are closed to vehicular traffic on Saturday.

Only pedestrians and registered show cars are allowed in the Village. If your show car can't make it, please don't try to park your daily driver or tow car in the show. Consider your entry fee as a donation to the club.

Each year over 20,000 people attend the show! After the show ends at 3:30 PM, entrants can go out on the Cruise around the Lake by heading west out of the Village, over the dam, continue on North Shore through Fawnskin (no burnouts!), through the camp site on north shore, and then on to the end of the cruise at Stanfield cutoff. Spectators are waiting to see your fabulous car! Info for entrants

Sign up online for the show at www.antiquecarclub.org. We do provide a link to a PDF application that you can print our if you prefer to mail it in with your check.

Preferred check-in is Friday from 10 AM to 6 PM. It is very difficult to check in on Saturday morning as parking is limited and the streets are closed before you are registered.

If you must check in Saturday morning, you can temporarily park in the volunteer parking in the north end of cottage lane. Go up to registration to receive your packet, then return to your car.

You must then exit to the north to get to your official entry. No shortcut entry into the show is allowed.

Entrances in the Village don't open until 7:30 AM on Saturday while our crew prepares the streets for the show.

All parking spaces in the show are assigned by the committee based on your preferred location in the Village.

Cars in the same car club will be parked together. We will make every attempt to park you with your friends. All parking spaces are assigned by the committee. Early entries are given priority for parking location.

NEW for 2025: The parking map has been updated for more sensible parking space numbering.

The only numbering that remains the same is on the east end of Village Drive. Please look at the new map to find the number of your preferred parking space.

At registration each entrant receives a mug with our beautiful 2-sided artwork, a Fun Run T-shirt, a cool "FUN RUN" license plate, a magnetic pin with our people's choice car on it, and a goody bag.



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
