Its time for Midnight at the Oasis 2017! This year's trek to Yuma started with six Tri-Five Revolution

Claudia's Corner

Why you should always put a coin in the freezer before you leave home.

Have you ever come home from vacation, business trip or maybe a weekend away with the family - and noticed your digital clocks flashing the wrong time?

You quickly realize that you had a power outage while you were away, but it's basically impossible

to tell when it occurred or how long it lasted. It's therefore also impossible to tell just how long the food in your freezer may have thawed, gotten destroyed and then frozen again.

Or is it?

In connection with Hurricane Matthews, which recently swept over parts of the eastern United States, a woman named Sheila Pulanco Russell shared a clever trick on her Facebook wall with anyone who was forced to evacuate their home.

But the trick is certainly also good to know in case of any prolonged departure from your home - and will ease your mind about whether or not the food in your freezer is good to eat - or best be thrown out right away.

The trick lies in the magical combination of three simple but effective tools everyone already has at home: a mug, a coin and some tap water.

You put a cup of water in your freezer. Freeze it solid, then put a quarter on top of it and leave it in your freezer. That way, when you come back after you've been gone, you can tell if your food went completely bad and just refroze, or if it stayed frozen while you were gone.

If the quarter has fallen to the bottom of the cup, that means all the food defrosted and you should throw it out. But if the quarter is either on the top or in the middle of the cup, your food may still be ok. It would be a great idea to leave this in your freezer all the time. Then, if you lose power for any reason, you will have this tip to fall back on.

If you don't feel good about your food, just throw it out. The main thing is for all to be safe.

The Kitchen Scoop on Butternut Pound Cake by Ann Goldberg

I've always enjoyed reading the ingredient lists of old recipes. I have cookbooks with recipes calling for '1 of Great Grandma's dessert spoonfuls of sugar', 'a wine glass of brandy', 'a tumbler of wine', pounds in place of cupfuls. 'Carolina Housewife's Wedding Cake of 1850!' found in 'Charleston Receipts, Serving the Lowcountry for Over 60 Years' has what I consider the ultimate recipe with ingredients in pounds and ounces. To make this cake you will need:

20 pounds butter
20 pounds sugar
20 pounds flour
20 pounds raisins
40 pounds currants
12 pounds citron

20 nutmegs
1 ounce mace
4 ounces cinnamon
20 glasses wine

20 glasses brandy10 eggs to the pound



Add cloves to your taste. If you wish it richer, add 2 pounds of currants, and 1 pound of raising to each pound of flour.

That's the recipe in its entirety No further instructions. No mention of the order ingredients should be combined, that nutmegs should be grated, baking pan size, oven temperature or baking time, or number of servings — just imagine how the quantity of cake made following this recipe!

Here's a much more practical cake recipe that you're sure to enjoy. This is shared with all of us by my friend Patty. It's easy and delicious.

Butternut Pound Cake

Preheat oven to 350 degrees

3 cups sugar

3 cups flour

1 cup butter, softened

1/2 cup shortening

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 small can evaporated milk with enough water added to make 1 cup

5 eaa

2 t butternut flavor (see below)

Butternut Flavor

Mix together:

1 t coconut extract

1 t rum extract

1 t butter extract

1 t lemon extract

1 t vanilla

Store in an airtight jar.

Cream sugar, butter and shortening until fluffy. Mix flour and salt. Add to creamed mixture, beating until slowly incorporated.

Continue beating while adding flavoring, evaporated milk/water mixture and the eggs one at a time.

Spray two loaf pans with cooking spray. Bake loaves for one hour or until a toothpick poked in the center of the loaf comes out clean. Let cool ten minutes. Remove from pans. Allow to cool throughly. If desired top cakes with a simple glaze of sifted confectioners sugar, milk and butternut flavoring.

1 pkg Good Seasons Italian dressing mix

Mix the vinegar, olive oil and dressing mix in a bowl on the side. Pour over ingredients in a large bowl. Mix well, serve with your favorite corn chips.




