Falling Objects and Old Chevys Don't Mix

On Monday morning, after the great weekend trip to Yuma and Midnight at the Oasis, a loud bang was heard in the garage. My first reaction to this sound was it must be a truck coming down our hillside street carrying a large load or equipment.

Later that morning, I went to the garage to get a screwdriver and saw my 10 foot long vintage surfboard that hangs by ropes above the 1957 Chevy wagon was laying across the hood of the car. The empty small cardboard boxes that were placed on top of the surfboard were thrown across the garage floor and the vehicle.

After recovering from the emotional shock of seeing this, I saw that one of the ropes had failed and caused the mess. Looking closer, I saw two long gouges in the left front fender caused by the long tail fin on the surfboard. The two rocket ridges in the 57 hood had caught the force of the fall and were not damaged. Luckily, the surfboard was hung behind the two hood rockets and they had not damaged the fiberglass on the surfboard. Being aware of the deductible on our homeowner policy, I knew that this damage would not be covered. Donna said, "What about our Grundy car policy?" Good idea Donna! I went online and filed a claim stating that a falling object had damaged the vehicle, not sure how a company out of Pennsylvania would understand that it was a surfboard that did the damage. The next day we received a call from an agent who asked me twice, "What fell?" Then that got the ball rolling. A local adjuster came to see the damage, and the next week we had a check.

I contacted Gary Jensen about doing the bodywork. He completed the work within two days. I'm currently looking for someplace to blend in the paint with the existing paint. This was my third claim with Grundy in 10 years on the Chevy. They have been very fair and easy to deal with. I highly recommend them for classic vehicle coverage.

I headed down to the show on Friday, those who have gone in the past know that this is a slow day with not a lot of cars showing up, maybe half as many as show up on Saturday.



Of course, the cars in the buildings come in on Thursday and must stay until Sunday so this is a great day to check them out. In the first building, there are some amazing cars, among them this year's Ridler Award Winning Renaissance Roadster. Theoretically a 1933 Ford, that was built

from scratch from the wheels up -- and the wheels were

custom, too! The body was hand-formed aluminum, power comes from an aluminum-block GM Performance Anniversary Edition 427 crate motor mated to a GM 4L60 transmission. Nothing on this car aside from the drive train is not custom! Can you believe that they



spent over 20,000 man hours building this car, so if you figure the shop rate



was \$100 an hour that equates to \$2,000,000 spent on this car? I must admit as much as we spent on the Nomad it falls well short of that figure!!!

Goldie Goes to on a Road Trip Highlights of 1,887 miles door-to-door

At six o'clock in the morning Friday, March 31, cleaned, clayed, polished, waxed and Rainx'd, I was on my way to eastern Tennessee and my biggest adventure ever. Off to Bean Staton, TN where I'd bunk in a friend's garage until the next weekend and the 35th annual Pigeon Forge Spring Rod Run.

We get on the road.

Though MapQuest estimates the 757 mile trip to take 11 hours and 37 minutes, my folks planned to make an overnight stop on the way. Being leisurely they made it three miles to the closest Dunkin' Donuts then stopped for the free-donut-when-you-show-your-AARPcard and order a large beverage deal. Three more miles and we reached the highway accompanied by a few sharp flashes of lightening and moderately heavy rain. An hour or so later we reached overcast skies, cool temperatures, and a light breeze. Perfect conditions for a day on the road. Except for the traffic.

The migration.

We'd been cautioned by a long-time Floridian to never attempt traveling north on the last weekend of either March or April. That's when visitors who came for 'the season' head back home. We didn't take the warning very seriously; turns out it's quite the phenomenon. More and more RV's, trailers and cars joining the exodus at every highway entrance. Like birds, they travel with their own kind — four to six cars from the same state in a caravan. Unlike birds many take their toys with them. The most creative packing job we saw: the large RV towing the big pick-up that has the Ski-Do in the bed and the motorcycle fastened to the back. The sheer volume slowed traffic to a crawl. When the highway narrowed and we lost a lane, things came to an almost standstill for over an hour. Amusing seeing people get out of their cars, set up beach chairs and sit in the shade in the grassy median for a while.

Traffic so bad that after thirteen hours on the road we'd only made it to St. George, South Carolina. (Another 5 hours, 313 miles to go — so much for an 11 and a half hour trip.)

The weather,

By Wednesday the weather had changed from cool, crisp, sunny to heavy, pelting rain; thunder; lightening, and dropping temperatures. The prediction for Thursday in Pigeon Forge, 90% chance of rain, strong winds and a forecast high of 46 degrees. I was relieved when the decision was reached to let me sit out show day 1 in the garage.





Friday was cold enough. 35 degrees when we left Bean Station; 42 degrees and windy when we arrived early. The LeConte Center was backdropped by the beautiful sight of 6 inches of newly fallen snow in the Smokies. Saturday morning it was even colder, just 36 degrees on site. Luckily, no wind. Not terrific 'let's sit out with the car' weather. By midday both days, it warmed.

Where you find the action.

Pigeon Forge is a tourist town. The main drag is loaded both sides with strip malls, T-shirt and souvenir stores, restaurants, dinner theaters and amusements. Each establishment has a parking lot out front. During car show week, the first row or two in these lots are filled with classic cars, project cars, just old cars, many of which are for sale. Parking here is tradition. There are more cars here at this 'anti-show' than in the LeConte Center and its exterior parking areas combined.

The Show.

The Spring Rod Run draws fabulous cars by name builders brought in in large car haulers and displayed inside the LeConte Center, good looking cars outside and a along with a long list of large vendors. Whether you're looking for a small part or something bigger, this is the place to come. And, they do. It's loads of fun watching shoppers hauling out their finds — bumpers, fenders and wheels with Christmasmorning smiles on their faces. In this part of Tennessee most car parts have to be ordered and waited for. Scoring things in person is a treat!



The crowd.

Foot traffic was heavy and active both days we were there. I soon learned southerners are very friendly and like to chat. Those who stopped to take a look at me didn't just mumble 'nice car' and wander off. They stayed to talk. They tell you about their cars, their friends cars, cars they used to have. I heard about the man who sold his Nomad for \$150 thousand to someone who later traded it for a house. And, there was the man who is positive all Nomad drivers should travel with a roll of wide blue painters tape to seal the lift gate in case of rain since they all seem to leak. Story after story. It was a lot of fun.







The winnings.

Most registrants don't leave this show early. Thirty plaques are awarded at the end of each Rod Run: twenty-five 'Best of Show' and an additional five 'Best of the Best'. The magnet to keeping people there though is the \$8,000 in cash prizes, winners drawn at the close of the show. All registration numbers are tossed in the drum and eleven are randomly drawn - eight \$500 prizes, two \$1,000 and one \$2,000.



I want to do it again!

It was a great time, a great experience. Looking forward to more long trips now that I've proven myself road worthy and the folks like the comfort of my new air conditioning and softer compound BFG shoes!
