

On Saturday, March 25, the California Nomads hosted the Lions Tri-Five Chevy Car Show at the Lions Automobilia Foundation and Museum in Rancho Dominguez, celebrating GM's most iconic trio of cars, the '55, '56 & '57 Chevrolet. This event sparked a lot of interest from Tri-Five owners in the San Diego area and resulted in ten vehicles being registered for this show. Among those in attendance were, Wayne Hartwig, Linda Holton, Rod & Nancy Hildebrand, Rich Correia, Don Perkins, Leon Smythe, Mike Clark, Tom & Nancy Geiman, Dana Stevens, Sam & Donna Rindskopf, George & Sherry Lee, and Tim Beall.

Our San Diego group of Tri-Fives met at the very chilly Aliso Creek Rest Area about seven miles north of Oceanside at 7 am to make the trip to Lions. Dana Stevens had a fuel leak issue with her Nomad and unfortunately had to leave her car at home, but she hitched a ride with the Geiman's and Don Perkins to join us on the trip. We headed north on I-5 with eight cars and Leon Smythe leading the way in his blue '55 wagon. Traffic was free flowing all the way to Rancho Dominguez, and we made good time despite missing the Santa Fe exit off the 405 freeway. We all arrived safely and without incident at 8:10 am. 75 Tri-Five Chevys of all colors, from stock to modifieds, were on display. Nomads were all being parked together while all others were parked in rows across the parking lot.



Entry fees included lunch tickets and entry to the museum. A food truck was on site for breakfast and lunch.

Some of us have memories of Lions and some of us never had the opportunity to visit the drag strip when it was in its heyday. So, here's a little history to help understand what a fabulous piece of automotive history Lions is and perhaps even relive a few of those memories. Lions Drag Strip was an American raceway in the Wilmington district of Los Angeles, California, adjacent to Long Beach from 1955 to 1972. The track was named after its sponsors, Lions Clubs International, and featured many races that were sanctioned by the American Hot Rod Association (AHRA). All the profits were donated through the Lions across several community charities including providing glasses for the blind.

Racing legend Mickey Thompson was the force behind developing Lions Drag Strip with the help of local officials



to see the project through completion and provide legalized drag racing to Southern California. October 9, 1955 was opening day. The Lions staff prepared for a crowd of 2500 attendees but over 10,000 people and over 400 cars showed up for the occasion. The overwhelming success of Lions enabled the initial loans to build the facility to be paid off in less than two years. In 1957, Mickey added lights and started promoting "Saturday Night Date Night" which doubled attendance. The flag start was replaced by a Christmas Tree starting system. In 1965, CJ Pappy Hart took over track management and created the Junior Fuel, Bracket, and Grudge Racing groupings. Hart also improved Lions' traction by adding traction coating for extra bite.

In 1972 Steve Evans, Lions' third track manager, renovated the facility and secured it as a sanctioned NHRA track and held the Grand Premiere. The Grand Premiere was notably the most successful event in the history of Lions. With the success of Lions popularity came additional noise complaints from nearby residents as the population increased. As a result of noise complaints, the Harbor Commission revoked the operating permit that Lions had been operating under for 18 years.

Lions, with its record-breaking open day in 1955, ended its reign with the same vigor. The last drag race took place on December 2, 1972. Over 20,000 people came, tearing down the gates to get a last glimpse of competition before the lights were to be turned off for the last time. Racers from across North America came to compete for the last time at Lions. Gary Beck, Jeb Allen, Jerry Ruth, Carl Olson, Don Moody, Dennis Baca, Mike Snively, Tom McEwen, Jim Dunn, Sush Matsubara, Don Prudhomme, Omar Carruthers, Dave Condit, Bil Leavitt and Billy Meyer. The final four included Don "The Snake" Prudhomme against Tom "The Mongoose" McEwen in Funny Car and Jeb Allen and Carl Olson in Top Fuel.











The treasured memories of Lions Drag Strip were once again experienced during the ribbon cutting ceremony of the Lions Drag Strip Museum on June 21, 2019. A local young man that grew up down the street from this iconic racetrack was so captivated by the loud roar of the engines, and the outrageous behavior of these machines as they tore down the quarter mile, he built a life size reproduction. Rick Lorenzen, a successful Wilmington businessman in the trucking industry, never forgot his first experience at Lions Drag Strip. The impact that Lions made on Rick, like many others, left a permanent mark that links Lions to fond memories of a modest time in Southern California. The Lions Drag Strip Museum is open for all ages to tour and learn how racing and the car culture



impacted its community and inspired the automotive industry. The nearly 100,000 sq. ft. facility not only includes galleries featuring Southern California's famous car culture and rich motorsports history, but it is also has the largest collection of Willys cars and trucks in North America and is home of the Spirit of the Lions Drag Strip Exhibit.

As our group of Tri-Fivers toured the museum, we were able to experience a

little of what it must have been like during the time. There were around 120 vehicles on display and the walls were covered with fabulous murals depicting that magical time. The recreated drag strip starting line had a red '55 Chevy two-door sedan staged in the right lane and a blue '57 Chevy sedan staged in the left lane. The Christmas tree lights were working






like it would have been at the time. Dragsters from the era were on display behind the Chevys. There was a lifelike mockup of the Long Beach Grand Prix, part

murals and part real cars. There was a recreation of a fifties Hobby Shop, Music Store, Foster's Freeze and a Texaco

Station appearing as it would have back then. Recently finished Rick's Diner, with a bar and tables was open where coffee and doughnuts could be purchased.

At 11 am, there was a presentation in the starting line bleachers by special guest speaker, Doug Marion from Super Chevy. Doug shared his story about Project X, a famous yellow '57 Chevy two-door sedan that Popular Hot Rodding magazine bought in 1965 for \$250 with the intent of modifying it in accordance with readers' wishes. Its sole reason for existing was to act as a testbed for new



hot rodding trends and technologies. Project X has been on 21 magazine covers and has been the subject of 93 articles, many of them technical stories where changes were made to the car. The readers of Popular Hot rodding loved it.

The car is currently being converted to an EV by Chevrolet. To me that's a shame and it's sad to see the original Project X changed so radically. If Chevrolet wanted to make an EV out of a '57 Chevy, it would have been better to keep the original Project X car intact for history and used another '57 to be an EV. Enough said.

For those of you that have ever been to the Danchuk's showroom in past years, you may remember Ernie who worked at the counter and was the tech guy. Ernie was at this show with his blue '55 Nomad and is retired and enjoying his retirement at the age of 84.

In the parking lot on display was a green '55 Chevy Nomad named Chevato, a wheelstander car built in 1965 powered by a rear mounted Olds Toranado drivetrain. It's an early dragster built specifically to do wheel stands and was a spectacular site to see. The car is currently being restored.

The last bit of business for the day was a raffle of numerous goody bags and a 50/50 raffle of around \$250. Then it was time to head on out for home. Except for some very slow traffic from just south of San Clemente to Oceanside, the trip home was uneventful, which is the way we like it.

Lions Drag Strip Overview

Compliments of Wikipedia "Lions Drag Strip was an American raceway in the Wilmington district of Los Angeles, California, adjacent to Long Beach that existed from 1955 to 1972. The track was named after its sponsors Lions Clubs International and featured many races that were sanctioned by the American Hot Rod Association (AHRA).

As the area surrounding the track increased in population, complaints regarding noise were made to government officials. Subsequently, efforts were made to deny the operators of track continued use of the facility and on November 2, 1972, that notice was given. After the last races took place on December 2, 1972, the track was torn down make space for overseas shipping cargo containers which exists to this day at 223rd Street & Alameda Street in Wilmington, CA."

My relationship with Lions Drag Strip

My history with Lions Drag Strip began in the mid 60s when as a high school kid with a passion for hot cars I began attending races there. Back then Lions was the closest drag strip to my home in Anaheim. Me and a few of my buddies attended almost every weekend. I owned a 1964 Dodge Dart with a 4 speed and a 273 cu in V8. I added a 4-barrel carburetor and exhaust headers with cherry bomb mufflers. While it wasn't fast by today's standards it was decent back then. I was nervous my first time lining up at the starting line at Lions. I had seen a car a few races before me roll to far through the staging lights and get a red light, so I went up there being super cautious, well the starter was annoyed that I was taking too long to stage and began getting on my case. I finally got staged and made a decent 14 second run. Well sometime later I met my future wife and found out that the jerk of a starter was her oldest brother Skip. I later went on to race as a part of the Vicious Vette funny car team. We did a lot of match races against another Corvette, known as Blue Hell, a kid on that crew and I got to be good friends and in fact he introduced me to his sister, you guessed it my wife of 53 years, Donna. This was Donna's other brother Spike. Our first date was to the drag races at a new race track Orange County International Raceway.

The Run to the Lions Museum

I have wanted to go to this museum for several years, I follow their page on Facebook. When I heard they were hosting a Tri-five Chevy Car Show, I was all in, this was just the excuse I needed! I signed up not knowing if any of my fellow Tri-five Revolutionaries were going or not. It turned out we had a few sign up. I also got word that a few members of Classic Chevy's of San Diego were going, the more the merrier I say! We all converged on the I-5 Rest Stop just north of Oceanside early the morning of the show. We had 10 Tri-Five Chevy's leave the rest stop and head up the coast toward Rancho Dominguez. The weather was perfect, and the traffic was not bad. The drive went well, the president of Classic Chevy's led the procession and we arrived right on time. Since the show was hosted by the California Nomad Club, they directed us in Nomads to a different parking area than the rest of our group. With our Tri-fives all safely parked and detailed we headed into the Museum. I was shocked at how big this museum is, from the outside you would not expect it to be anywhere near as big as it is. They had coffee and donuts available for those who wanted it, also a food truck outside which served up a great Mexican lunch.

The museum features a replica of the starting line and staging lanes from the original Lions Drag Strip, even an image of Pappy Hart the track general manager that took over after the untimely death of Mickey Thompson. The starting line featured a 55 Chevy and a 57 Chevy staged and ready for the Christmas tree to light. I suspect they put those two Tri-fives on the starting line in honor of the Tri-five Chevy Show. Well done!

In addition to many famous drag cars, there are movie cars, classic cars, custom cars, tons of memorabilia, even simulated store fronts loaded with artifacts of the time, and a restaurant which is also period correct. The museum even has an area depicting the Long Beach Grand Prix. The event also featured a guest speaker discussing the history of a very famous 57 Chevy that had been featured in many car magazines back in the day and is still in existence. Oh, and did I mention that the manager is Lana Chrisman, daughter of Jack Chrisman a famous drag racer credited with creating the world's first Funny Car, a beautiful and fast 1965 Mercury Comet. Lana's uncle Art Chrisman was also a famous drag racer back in the day.

For me this was an amazing trip down memory lane, reminding me of what I call the Golden Age of Drag Racing. I watched a lot of these cars race, and I remembered the excitement I felt when I drove under the bridge from the staging lanes up to the line to stage my car. I definitely plan to go back; you can't see it all in a single day. 

At 2 pm, awards were announced, and we had two winners in our group of four. Congratulations to Dana Stevens and Sam & Donna Rindskopf!


32nd Annual Big Bear Fun Run
