September 15th, 2018 the Liberty Lake Police Department sponsored a fund raiser for Special Olympics, called "Cops, Cars and Cruisers for Special Olympics". Liberty Lake is a small community east of Spokane, Washington, nearly on the Idaho border. It included a display of police vehicles, a car show, a barbecue and a cruise through the area. Several other towns sent some of their officers and equipment to the event as well, including the county Sheriff's department. There were about 100 cars at the show, including some awesome SWAT vehicles.

Prior to the cruise, all trophys were to be given out except for Best of Show. They wanted all the cars to return to the police department after the cruise to award the Best of Show trophy separately. 

The annual Halloween party at San Diego County's Edgemoor Hospital in Santee was held on Friday, October 26th. Edgemoor Hospital used to be known as Edgemoor Geriatric Hospital, but it

has now moved to a new location, is much larger, very modern, and provides a wide range of 24-hour skilled nursing care and rehabilitation for all ages.

Edgemoor was originally built in the 1850s as an award-winning dairy farm, and in 1923 the County of San Diego acquired it for use as a "last resort" home for the aged and indigent. By the mid-1920's, the Edgemoor cared for 520 people. It was one of the last poor farms (or farm homes) established in the United States prior to the Great Depression and the introduction of Social Security. Through the years the County added new buildings, and in 1950, apartments and wards were added. In 1953 the County discontinued the farm and dairy operations, and renovated the barn. In 1955 the name was changed to Edgemoor Geriatric Hospital.

A new hospital building was erected in 1966, but over the years, a series of financial problems, facility



issues, and basic care of patients, led to the decision to close Edgemoor Geriatric Hospital. The closure facilitated the building of a new hospital. The new facility at 655 Park Center Drive opened January 23, 2009. Unfortunately, the decision was made to demolish all the old buildings on the previous Edgemoor property except for one; the Dutch gambrel roof barn, built in 1913, which has since been designated as a National Historic Site. The Barn's address was later changed from 9064 Edgemoor Drive to its current address of 9200 N. Magnolia Ave.



The car show has been the main feature of the annual Halloween party for the residents for nine years now. They cordon off a section of the parking lot that holds about 75 cars, and it makes for a very nice venue.



Between each row in the parking lot, there are very wide, grassy medians and lots of mature trees, so most of the car owners can set up their chairs near their cars in the shade.

Registration opened at nine, but when I arrived at 9:05, almost all the places were already taken, and other car owners said they got there about 8:00 so they could park in a shady spot. Since I didn't know anyone there, and had one of the sunny spots, I got my chair out and sat with a group of guys about my age. They seemed like a nice bunch of guys, but I soon found out they were all Ford owners. However, I think they could be rehabilitated, as they all have small-block Chevys in their old Fords (30s and 40s vintage).

The cars were primarily classics, ranging from 30s to 60s, with a couple of 70s-era cars. There were no late model cars at all, even though there were no restrictions as to vehicle year. It was nice to see true classics and no cars with plastic bumpers.

Each registrant was given a lunch ticket(s) for a nice lunch served at noon, there was live music (but not too loud, and they played lots of oldies) on the courtyard/plaza, and free coffee all morning. There were many residents roaming the area in their wheelchairs, and they really appreciated the cars. This is a very nice



location, no charge of course to participants, and a nice lunch is provided at noon. It would be more fun if a group of our own members went, but it was still a very nice event and a lot of fun.





Claudia's Corner

Here is a wonderful treat to wake up to on Thanksgiving morning while you are preparing your turkey for the oven.

CINNAMON SWIRL BREAD

- 1/3 cup white sugar
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 cup milk
- 1/3 cup vegetable oil
- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Lightly grease a 9x5 inch loaf pan. In a small bowl, mix together 1/3 cup sugar and 2 teaspoons cinnamon; set aside.
- 2. In large bowl combine flour, baking powder, salt and remaining 1 cup sugar. Combine egg, milk, and oil; add to flour mixture. Stir until just moistened.
- 3. Pour half of the batter into pan. Sprinkle with half the reserved cinnamon/sugar mixture. Repeat with remaining batter and cinnamon/sugar mixture. Draw a knife through batter to marble.
- 4. Bake in preheated oven for 45 to 50 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into center of the loaf comes out clean. Let cool in pan for 10 minutes before removing to a wire rack to cool completely. Wrap in foil and let sit overnight before slicing.

And an easy, make ahead dessert for Thanksgiving Day if you are not a fan of traditional pumpkin pie.

PECAN PIE BARS

1 (18.25 ounce) package yellow cake mix

1/2 cup margarine, softened

1 egg

3 eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1 1/2 cups dark corn syrup

1/2 cup packed brown sugar

1 cup chopped pecans

2/3 cup yellow cake mix

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease a 9x13 inch pan.

Reserve 2/3 cup cake mix.


Mix together remaining cake mix, margarine, and 1 egg. Pat in prepared pan.

Bake at 350 degrees F (175 degrees C) for 15-20 minutes or until golden brown.

Beat together 3 eggs, vanilla, reserved 2/3 cup cake mix, corn syrup, and brown sugar. Pour on cake in pan. Sprinkle pecans on top.

Bake at 350 degrees F (175 degrees C) for 30-35 minutes.

Tri-Five Chevy 1955, 1956 & 1957 Chevrolet Passenger Cars

(Part 3)

1955 CHEVY 210 2-DOOR COUPE

The 2-door Coupe differs from the 2-door Hardtop in several key ways: 1.) The Coupe's doors feature framed-windows, where the Hardtops are frameless, like a Convertible; 2.) The biggest difference is the presence of a B-

pillar, or "Post" between the front- and rear-side windows. Because of this, Coupes are often referred to as "2-door Posts"; and 3.) The back window is pushed toward the rear of the car on a Coupe, shortening the trunk deck, but enlarging the rear seat area, greatly adding to headroom. The proportions are not as visually pleasing as the Hardtops (at least in the opinion of some), but they are still very popular, and during the heydays of stock car racing (when they were really stock), these were more popular because they were lighter & more rigid than the Hardtops, due to the additional post supporting the roof.



1956 CHEVY BEL AIR 2-DOOR HARDTOP

Probably the most popular body style of the Tri-Five Chevys, the 2-door Hardtop combines the best of all worlds, which is exactly what it was designed to do. It give you the comfort & security of a solid roof, while also offering the open-air feel

of a convertible. The back seat may have been smaller than in the 2-door Coupe or any of the 4-doors, but hey, these cars were huge! So, no problem. And plenty of extracurricular activity took place in those back seats, for sure. With the windows down, it's easy to see how the whole side opens us, thanks to the elimination of the B-pillar, or "Post", and the frameless doors. The Hardtop also has a much more sporty roofline in the back (they're all the same in front), and a longer trunk deck. This gives this very large, full-sized car a sportier look. And it works. These are gorgeous, well-proportioned cars, that were on par with anything built anywhere, at the time.



1957 CHEVY BEL-AIR 4-DOOR HARDTOP

The "Hardtop-craze" was raging in the late-50s. The idea was to make a conventional car look & feel more like a convertible. This was accomplished by using un-framed windows (the doors were like those used on Convertibles), and by eliminating the B-pillar, or "Post" between the front-and back-side windows. So, with all the windows down, there was a huge, unbroken opening the length of the cab, giving it

that "open-air convertible feel". So, if the Convertible was a Soft Top, then this must be a Hardtop. 2-door and 4-door Hardtops proliferated from every manufacturer. This 4-door Hardtop is a prime example of the type. Note the more rakish C-pillar when compared to the vertical C-pillar on the Sedan. This in turn eliminates the rear tiny rear-quarter window on the Sedan, and gives the rear roofline and backlight (rear window) a totally different shape.
