# Goodguys 1st Meguiar's So-Cal Nationals

Good Guys was back in Del Mar on September 30 and October 1 & 2, 2022 with the 1st Meguiar's So-Cal Nationals. This show was really just like every other Good Guys Del Mar car show with a different name.

One big difference was attendance, which was definitely down from the April show. In fact, while there were over 2,000 entries in April, there was just around 1,100 entries at this show. Fortunately, the weather was much better without all the rain we had in April.

The event kicked off on Thursday morning with a trip to the host Hilton Hotel to pick up our registration packets and then to the main parking lot to participate in the 10 am coastal cruise. Linda and I decided to drive our Little Brownie '55 Delray 210 on the cruise and when we arrived, there were only two other cars there for the cruise. Just before 10 am, a few others arrived and among them was Tom & Nancy Geiman in their '55 Belair hardtop. The Good Guys 1988 all white Chevrolet give-away truck also made the cruise with the group, but the group was smaller than usual with only around a dozen cars. This year, the cruise was organized by George Cowman of the Poway Cruisers, but it followed the same route as it did on previous cruises. It was a bit foggy in the beginning, but as we cruised down the coast past Torrey Pines and headed up the road to Mount Soledad to the National Veteran's Memorial, the sun started breaking through. After visiting the memorial for a while, the

cruise continued down the hill to Classics Malt Shop in Point Loma where we had a nice lunch stop. From there, the route was the same as before, ending at the Automotive Museum in Balboa Park. The only problem was that the museum was closed because they were changing out the exhibits. So, we decided to forgo the rest of the tour and headed for home.



Friday morning was cool and overcast, but it was a really nice day for a car show. The crowd of people was really light, and we wondered where they all were. We took the opportunity to see all three indoor venues, all the indoor and outdoor vendors, which were very sparse, and to spend a little time with friends we met along the way. This year, the Autocross track was relocated to the back eastern part of the parking lot and a large portion of the specialty parking was now where the Autocross used to be.

We had seen just about all there was to see, so at 2:30, the Geiman's, Dana, and Linda & I left Good Guys and cruised across the Del Dios Highway to the last night of Cruisin' Grand in Escondido, featuring race cars and dragsters. We had dinner at Filippi's Pizza Grotto before taking in the sights of the show. The Streets were closed off to regular traffic and there were several dragsters and a bunch of race cars continuously firing up and filling the air with the sweet sounds of open headers. At one point the race cars were paraded up and down Grand Avenue, a really cool site to see.



The weather on Saturday was mostly a repeat of the day before and we were back at Del Mar at 8:30 am along with Tom & Nancy Geiman. As the morning went by, numerous familiar classics were rolling in. We parked the convertible in the Tri-Five Chevy row with the Geiman's and ten other Tri-Fives. We put Linda's truck in the Homebuilt section, in the next row.

Once parked, we made our way inside the O'Brien building and spent some time with our friend's from

Armando's Custom Upholstery and revisited some cars and vendors along the way. We eventually worked our way back to the food vendors for some lunch and then back to the car to rest up a bit. A

few minutes later, we saw the judges starting up the Tri-Five Chevy row and we just stayed back to watch and see what they were going to do. They walked past the first three cars and stopped at the convertible for a couple minutes while taking some notes. Then they proceeded down the line and stopped at a red and white '56 Nomad for a couple minutes. After a brief conversation between the judges, they came back to the convertible and had another conversation. One



judge then came to us and said it was a difficult decision between our convertible and the '56 Nomad. He said they had decided to give the "Best Tri-Five" award to the Nomad. However, they were going to give us the "Cool Convert" award. Shortly after that and knowing we would be back on Sunday for the awards ceremony, we decided to head home for the day.



Award winners are required to be back and in the winner's circle by 10 am on Sunday. We arrived around 9 am, parked the car and headed out to see the swap meet and the

Autocross. There were only five vendors left in the swap meet area and it looked like a real bust. So, we went to watch Autocross for a while. The course appeared to be smaller and more compact than

previously. There weren't too many entries there either. But there were two Tesla Electric cars making runs on the course. Since a Tesla doesn't really make any noise, the announcer was playing racecar sounds over the PA every time a Tesla made a run. It was comical, but a Tesla had the fastest time during the show and won the Autocross award. It just seems really weird and perhaps a good indicator of how our collector car hobby is evolving.

We had to be back at the car by 1 pm, even though nothing happens until 2:22 pm when the cars were paraded past the Good Guys Stage in the Entertainment Area. Weather was nice and sunny, so the top was down as we were presented with our award. We then parked in front of the Entertainment Area and walked in to see the last half of the awards being presented.

Even though the entries and spectators were a bit sparse, it was a good show and there is already an Early Bird Special flyer out for October 6-8, 2023 for the 2nd Meguiar's So-Cal Nationals at the Del Mar Fairgrounds. See you there!

Registration packets had to be picked up at the Holiday Inn Express across the freeway before entering the show area. The showed was completely sold out with 501 entries.

We should have left San Diego sooner on Friday as traffic on I-15 was super bad. We arrived at the host hotel at 5 pm and got to the cruise at 5:30. Lots of cars were parked on the streets and lots more were cruising the route. We met up With Sam & Donna and cruised the route for a while before we parked and went to dinner at Anthony's. By 9 pm, the streets were pretty much emptied out, and we headed for home.



Saturday morning came really early. Linda did not go to the show on Saturday as she went to the funeral of a longtime friend in Orange County. Since side Street parking was first come, first served, I met Sam & Donna at their house at 6 am along with their neighbor friend Norm to cruise on over to the show. Hundreds of cars were already there, and a lot of good side street spaces were filled. As we went down the street, we were able to get three nice spots next to the Sidelines Sports Bar & Grill. We had nice shade there almost all day.



After cleaning up the cars and completing the score sheet for the judges, we headed out to look at cars and get apple fritters at the doughnut shop. The streets were clearly posted no parking for the

duration of the event, but at least three people chose to ignore those signs. Police and tow trucks were on site and towed all three of

them. At 9 am, there were opening ceremonies with a Color Guard from NROTC, the "Pledge of Allegiance", a Drifter member playing "Amazing Grace" on the bagpipes, a salute to military veterans, and the singing of the National Anthem.



There was a prize raffle and a 50/50. The 50/50 is a big draw and typically brings in over \$3,500 each time. This year, the winner took home a little over \$1500! We spent quite some time looking at just about every entry in the show. There were quite a few really nice high-dollar cars as well as a whole bunch of the cars we see at almost every car show. Soon, we were ready for a chair, a snack and a drink so we headed back to the cars. While we were there, we saw a judge with a clipboard and a dog on a leash heading toward our cars. Judging was to cover every aspect of the car including engine bay, interior, body & paint, undercarriage and cleanliness. Our judge barely looked at anything before moving on to the next entry. Sam thought I was being picked for a trophy but he was convinced he wasn't a winner.



Awards were to be presented at 2:15 pm, right after the raffle and 50/50. There were no specialty awards or Best of Show awards, just 63 "Diamond Awards" for the top 63 entries. A backdrop was set up for photos of the winners, but dark clouds were coming in and wind gusts picked up. Two Drifters had to hang onto the backdrop to keep it from blowing over. The first award was

presented to the Drifters "Member of the Year", who is also the club photographer. Award winners were being

announced and two-thirds of the awards had been presented when they called Sam & Donna's name for an award. Then, finally, they called my name and shortly after that, they called Norm's name as a winner for his '58 Chevy Pickup. As the last



award was presented, the police were opening up the streets and cars were leaving like rats off a sinking



ship. I suppose the threat of rain had something to do with that and we did get some sprinkles just as we were leaving. I thought I had driven out from under the rain, but a few miles down the road, I got dumped on twice in a five-mile stretch. But it was clear sailing the rest of the way home.




# San Diego Auto Museum's Annual "Trunk or Treat"


