The Mustang Club of San Diego hosted their 2023 "Mustangs By The Bay" Car Show on Saturday, October 7th at Seaport Village Embarcadero North. This year's theme was "Celebrating the 55th Anniversary of the California Special."

Up until now, I was under the impression this show was only open to Mustangs. However, this show also has a category for other entries that are not Mustangs. I learned this from Dennis DiLucente, member of the Mustang Club, when he invited Don Perkins to display his 1940 Ford COE truck at the show. Linda and I were already planning to go to this show, so why not enter our classics and avoid having to find a place to park? So, we did!

Temperatures were soaring everywhere around the county and that seemed like all the more reason to spend the day at the bay at a car show. It was



extremely foggy in Kearny Mesa with very limited visibility when we were leaving for the show, but it was burning off rather quickly. By the time we dropped down into Mission Valley, visibility improved immensely and by the time we reached the Embarcadero, the sun was popping through.

The Embarcadero grass was already well covered with Pony cars everywhere we looked. Then we hiked back to the top of the hill to get a breakfast burrito from the Boy Scouts. They would later serve hamburgers and hot dogs for lunch. DJ Paul Palombo was spinning our favorite tunes and giving away prizes for those answering his trivia questions. Raffle tickets were being sold as well as 50/50 tickets, and a silent auction was going on too. There was a hula hoop contest for those under the age of sixteen.

At 10:00 am, the National Anthem was played, and the show was officially underway. Judges began making their way around to look at the different classes of Mustangs and the AO (All Others) group of entries. We eventually made our way around to see the majority of the Mustangs including every year from the very first models to the most current models.

Awards were announced promptly at 2:00 pm, starting with all of the Mustang classes. One by one, winners were announced and presented with a trophy. When they announced the awards for best engine, paint, interior etc., we were surprised to hear they had chosen our convertible for the "Best Interior" award. We were sure it would have gone to one of those beautiful Mustangs. Toward the end, awards for the AO class of cars were being announced. That's when they called Linda Holton up to receive the "Best in Class" award for her '69 Chevy C20 Pickup.

# The Murrieta Rod Run 2023

The Murrieta Rod Run (MRR) is a 2-day event just like the Temecula Rod Run. Tri-Five Revolutionaries attending were Sam and Donna Rindskopf in their 1957 Nomad, Dana Stevens in her 1956 Nomad, and Wayne Hartwig and Linda Holton in Wayne's 1955 Chevy Convertible.

The MRR is put on by the Drifters of Southern California and all the proceeds go to support the Oak Grove Center. This year marked the tenth year for the event which was founded by Drifter Pat Vesey. Pat was the Co-founder of the Temecula Rod Run and the founder of the Drifters Car Club.

The Oak Grove Center is a nonprofit Residential, Education and Treatment Center for at-risk and special needs youth. The Oak Grove's mission is to rebuild the lives of at-risk children and their families through educating. healing. and relationships, building character, and instilling hope. Serving more than 800 children and teens each year. the Oak Grove offers a wide spectrum of services: residential care, education, wraparound, sports and the arts, programs for autism and independent living, partial hospitalization, outpatient services, addiction recovery and relapse programs, and much more. This year the MRR raised nearly \$65,000 for the Oak Grove Center.

The MRR starts out with a Friday night cruise in old town Murrieta and is followed up with a Saturday show and shine. The old town Murrieta venue is limited to 500 cars. This year the weather was perfect for both the Friday night cruise and the Saturday show and shine. We arrived for Friday's cruise around 3:00 p.m. and spotted Wayne and Linda already parked, Wayne hollered to us that there was a parking







spot near where he was parked so we quickly backed in. Thank you, Wayne! We pulled out our folding chairs and set them up and sat down to enjoy watching all the classic cars cruising up and down the main drag of old town Murrieta. Not long after we arrived, I got a text from my brother Jeff who lives in Murrieta letting me know that he and his wife Karla were planning on coming down for the cruise night.

Not long after we were parked an old friend and fellow 57 Nomad owner came by. We met several years ago at a car show in Fallbrook. Again, the best part of these shows are the people! After catching up with Gary and sharing stories about our 57 Nomads we said goodbye.

Donna and I enjoyed walking around the MRR and checking out the cars, the vendors, and of course talking with our friends. Since moving to Temecula and joining the Drifters Car Club Donna and I have gotten to know a lot of car people in our area. Of course, it is always awesome when some of our fellow Tri-Five Revolutionaries come to these events, and we get to spend time with them. # Nomad Repairs Part I

It started out as a typical Friday in September, Friday Night Cruise on Grand Ave in Escondido. On the way to Grand in the Nomad, I could hear a small ticking sound coming from the exhaust area of the car, I thought just another exhaust leak and it could be fixed with a new gasket. I made my way down to Grand Ave and parked on Broadway, enjoying the evening with fellow cruisers. I rarely stay for the awards ceremony due to the darkness driving home to Valley Center. This time around I was chosen for Cruisin' Grand 2023 Gosch Ford Escondido WINNER Friday night Hot Spot September 8th, 2023.



After the awards ceremony, I headed home towards the Valley Center grade and the ticking sound became a, CLATTERING SOUND from the driver side valve cover. I knew then from past experience that the sound was a Rod and Rocker arm banging against the valve cover. I had one chance to make it up the Valley Center grade, I have one more stoplight to go at Lake Wolford road. After that no street lights and no where to really park if I break down, I had nothing to lose. GO FOR IT! 60 mph never lost power it just got LOUDER! It felt like eternity getting up the hill, but I finally made it home in one piece?

Within a few weeks, Wayne and Linda Hartwig were kind enough to make a house call and troubleshoot the issue. Wayne removed the D/S valve cover and immediately saw that the # 5 Rocker arm was misaligned with the existing ones. Ten years ago almost to the date, JD and I replaced the same Rod and Rocker Arm. Upon this inspection the Rod was not damaged but there was a small nick on the surface of the Rocker Arm. Basically because of the minimal damage and it was the same Rod and Rocker Arm from ten years ago, we decided to go a different route and look for potential damage to the Lifter's and Lifter plates?

With over 112,000 plus miles on the Nomad and over 17 years of driving it all over the country it's probably a REAL good idea to be sure there's no more damage to the motor, which means I still have to put the Nomad on a rollback.

Wayne and I started to talk about getting replacement parts for the Nomad. JD ordered the Chevy small block ZZ 383 stroker with hydraulic cam and vortex heads in 2005. With JD's impeccable and obsession record keeping during the start of the Nomad build in 2002 completed in 2006 to his passing in 2019, he filed every receipt including every part he put into the Nomad, a tradition I have been following since.







I ordered a new Rod/Rocker Arm, 2 Lifters and plates as well as the center plate that keeps the lifters aligned, manifold gaskets specifically fitted for vortex heads and valve cover gaskets.

The following week on a Thursday morning, I ordered a rollback with Joe Keller's help and had it towed to Wayne Hartwig's shop and the work commenced. Draining 2/3 of the radiator, disassemble all the components that were connected to the manifold and

remove it. Upon visual inspection the lifters and plates, and the center plate all perfectly aligned within the manifold area. The lifters rolled smoothly and no damage to lifter plates or center plate, no damage to engine studs. Now, HURRY UP AND WAIT FOR PARTS!!!for about a day in half, Wayne and I did some deep cleaning to the inside and out of the manifold and engine compartment.

I was able to do some undercarriage detailing as well. Saturday was a car show Wayne and Linda already had registered for and parts started to show up on Saturday night. Early Sunday morning back to the shop. Replaced one lifter, no lifter plate there's nothing wrong and replaced the center plate, rod, rocker arm. And everything else that needed to be reconnected to the top of the manifold. Wayne fixed my D/S and P/S door handle, and my turn key ignition needed to be reset. By 5 PM DONE!

Wayne and Linda followed me home and I drove the Nomad. Running SMOOTHLY NOT A CLATTERING nor a TICKING sound to be heard!!

Another good ten more years to come!!!!! PART II to follow.

### California Legalizes Automobile Cruising

Success in California! Governor Gavin Newsom signed SAN-supported legislation (AB 436) into law to allow automobile cruising activities to return statewide. Previously, local authorities were authorized to pass ordinances that regulate or prohibit cruising. Authored by Assembly Member David Alvarez (D-San Diego), this effort follows a resolution approved by the legislature last year to celebrate the history and culture of automobile cruising and encourage local officials and law enforcement to work with local car clubs to conduct safe cruising events. The new law will go into effect January 1, 2024.




