
Revolution Review



'56 '55 '57







Every time we go to a car show event, flyers for upcoming car shows find their way into all the cars. It's probably the single best way to get the word out to potential entrants about upcoming shows. A couple weeks ago, we received a flyer for an out-of-town car show that looked interesting. It was the 11th Annual one-day "Cool Run In The Mountains" car show in Big Bear. This show was put on by the Rodriders of Big Bear Car Club and held at the Big Bear Lake Convention Center. This is not the three-day Big Bear Fun Run normally held in August in the Big Bear Lake Village put on by the Big

Bear Classic Car Club. In fact, this is the first time I ever heard there were two car clubs in Big Bear and two different car shows. After much thought and consideration about making the drive to Big Bear for a one-day show, Linda and I decided to go for it and invited Rod & Nancy Hildebrand to join us. The thought of cooler temperatures and a new car show for a day convinced them to make the trip with us.

The show was scheduled to start at 9 am, so we knew we would need to leave San Diego around 5:30 am to assure arrival by then. We all met up at the shop and much to our dismay, there was very thick marine layer and heavy wet fog in Kearny Mesa. We headed north in the dark with a lot of need for use of the wipers until we got up to Escondido. At that point, the fog lifted, and the sun was starting to come up. We arrived at the Chevron station in Highland about 7:30 am and after a quick fill-up and restroom break, we were on our way up highway 33 to Big Bear.





That part of the trip went without a hitch, and we arrived at the Convention Center about ten minutes before 9 am. The parking lot appeared to be about three-quarters full and I think we were the last to arrive. We checked in and were told to see the tall man named Jim on where to park. For some reason, Jim wanted to park us way in the back away from most of the other entrants, but fortunately another Rodrider member pointed Rod to a pair of nice spots right up front by the DJ, which were much like power parking spots. Sam would have loved it. Jim was not happy about that, but much to our delight, he was over-ruled.

The weather was just about perfect, around 82 degrees with a nice breeze. We had to do some serious detailing after driving in the fog to make the cars look their best before we could check out the rest of the cars and the raffle. There were 103 total entrants, which was apparently considered a success by the club. The raffle was nice with about 25 raffle prizes and a 50/50 raffle. Each prize had a container for tickets and



you put your tickets in the container for the prize or prizes you wanted to win. You had to be present to win the prizes, so we stayed within earshot when winning ticket numbers were called. Rod was a double winner, taking home a cornhole game with American flags on it and a big box of Nerf Guns for the grandkids. The 50/50 was worth \$480, but we were not winners.



Once we were ready for a break, we set up our chairs in the shade of a big pine tree and sat down to enjoy watching the people go by. We made a few new friends along the way and really enjoyed this show. Lunch was available at Wyatt's, but the line was long, the food was pricey, and slow to come out. We decided to wait for In & Out later.

The top 15 Awards were determined by "People's Choice" and anyone and everyone could vote for their three favorites. We even saw small children walking around with ballots in their hand. There were also several specialty awards like Top Ford, Top Mopar, Top Chevrolet and Best Engine. Rod & Nancy won one of the top 15 awards and the

convertible was chosen for the "Rodriders Choice" award, which was sort of like second place. The trophy was a piston and rod with gold wings on it, matching the club's logo. The Best of Show trophy went to a 64 Dodge. I was glad not to win that award because it was a big gnarly looking thing made from lots of used car parts including two camshafts and a flex plate with a clock in the middle standing about two feet high. The show was over about 3 minutes before 3 pm as advertised and soon we were on our way



back down the hill to Highland where it was still 100 degrees. We stopped at In & Out for a double-double combo and then headed for home with no problems. This was a really nice and well-organized show. It's a long way for a one-day show, but we would consider doing it again. But I think going up the day before would be a better way to do it. It's on the maybe list.

Took a Little Trip

On the 20th of August, a good friend of mine in his 1961 Corvette (purchased new by his dad back in 61), another good friend in his 2019 Corvette, and I set out for a cross-country trip we had been planning for a couple of years. We were on our way to Carlisle, PA to attend the national Straight Axle Corvette Club convention, and to attend Corvettes at Carlisle, the largest 3 day Corvette show and swap meet in the nation. The first couple of days were filled with stops along Route 66, but most were very short photo ops as we needed to run about 500 miles/day. That got to be a daily chore in 90+ deg heat and high humidity that made for some uncomfortable rides.

Our first stop the following morning was Effingham, IL, at one of the major Corvette vendors, Mid America, where there is also a great Corvette museum.

One final stop to visit the museum at the Indy 500 track in Indianapolis, and then it

was strictly stay on the interstates and beat our way to Carlisle. We arrived on Wednesday 25 August in time to register and join the evening reception and party.

The next day was a free day so we journeyed about 90 miles to Allentown, PA, to visit the "America on Wheels" museum.

This museum houses the complete 1950s

soda fountain, lunch counter, grill, booths, etc from the drugstore in the small Indiana town where I grew up. It was like a trip back in time.



We made many more photo op stops at restored gas stations, restaurants and motels along Route 66 in Groom & Shamrock, TX; Weatherford, Arcadia, & Tulsa, OK; Carthage, MO & finally, at the National Transportation Museum in West St Louis. At our overnight stop in Vandalia, IL, we were joined by 2 more solid axle friends

As you might imagine, both Fred and I got the long distance award at the Convention.



SAN DIEGO CALIFORNIA HIGHWAY PATROL CLASSIC CAR SHOW

The San Diego Area Office of the California Highway Patrol (CHP) put on its first annual classic car show on September 4 to benefit the 11-99 Foundation. The 11-99 Foundation was established in 1982 to provide emergency benefits and assistance to California Highway Patrol employees and scholarships to their children. 11-99 is the code used by officers and dispatchers meaning "officer needs assistance." Since 1982, the 11-99 Foundation has provided over \$42 million in support of CHP families.

This car show was sponsored by the 645 Squad Club of the CHP and was held at the new San Diego CHP Area Office on Kearny Villa Road. Why was it called 645 Squad Club Classic Car Show? Being a retired CHP employee, I know the answer. The CHP divided the state into eight Divisions and within each Division there are a number of area offices. San Diego is part of Border Division, Division 6, and their area number is 45, hence the 645 designation.

Since this was the first annual classic car show event put on by the 645 Squad Club, we did not know what to expect, how many cars would show up, or how well organized it would be. Kearny Villa Road was blocked off at each end and entrants were required to enter from Ruffin Road. Cars were parked on both sides of the street, and I counted 192 entries, which I heard was more than anticipated. Between Classic Chevys of San Diego and Tri-Five Revolution, there were at least ten vehicles in attendance.

There was also a big yellow Crown school bus attending this event and much to my surprise, it was owned by a guy named Robert that I knew back in the late 70's and early 80's when I was working in the charter bus industry. I knew he was working in the school bus business, but I hadn't seen him in over 30 years. In fact, we did not recognize each other until we started talking about his bus. He bought this bus and restored it using "G911" as the number on the bus. The "G" is for the Goodall's Charter Bus Company where he worked for many years and the "911" is for the Twin Towers attack. It was really nice to make a reconnection with him. Sometimes it is a really small world.




There was a DJ from radio station Magic 92.5 playing music, but the music was a little on the new side and not generally the kind we hear at most car shows. There were numerous clean portapotties and wash stations available just inside the west gate. There were supposed to be five food trucks, but only three showed up. One as a waffle truck, one was Hawaiian food, and one was burgers and sandwiches. We chose Leilani's Hawaiian for lunch and ordered the Loco Moco, which was a teriyaki covered hamburger over white rice with brown gravy. It was really good!

There was a raffle of sorts. A Harley Davidson Sports Glide white pearl motorcycle was the grand prize and tickets were \$50 each. There was also a big screen TV, an XBOX, Padre tickets, hotel rooms, air pods and more.

The highlight of the show was an appearance by Erik Estrada, better known as Ponch on the TV show "Chips." Erik was very nice and very courteous. After he was presented with a couple awards, there was a long line of people wanting to get a photo with him. Erik stayed and graciously posed for photos until everyone had their opportunity. CCSD member Robert Feliciano was one of the first to have his photo taken with Erik. Erik also signed awards for a couple of award winners.

There were awards for Best Interior, Best Paint, Cleanest, Crowd Favorite and Overall Event Winner. I

CAR CLEANING HACKS

Learned some interesting 'stuff' while listening to a more-than-self-proclaimed car cleaning guru recently. This fellow has won Concours d' Elegance competitions on the national level and currently

judges these events. According to him we should all:

Add the following to our collection of car cleaning supplies:



The thunder boats were back in San Diego this year after being absent for the last few years. Bayfair San Diego thunder boat racing started in 1964 and has been a very popular venue over the years. This year's Bayfair included a classic car show organized by Charger Steve. For \$25, entrants had premier parking among the other car show entries at Crown Point Park and received two Bayfair passes to ride the shuttle to the boat area and to see the races.

Six Classic Chevys of San Diego members brought their classic cars out to beautiful Mission Bay to be among the thousands there to enjoy the World Series of Power Boat Racing. Leon Smythe was there with his '55 Chevy wagon, George and Sherry Lee came with their '56 Chevy 210 hardtop, Rod & Nancy Hildebrand brought their '57 Chevy 150 sedan, Don Perkins drove his recently acquired '67 Corvette, Linda drove her '69 Chevy C20 pickup and I had my '55 Chevy convertible. I estimated around 250 entrants participated in the car show. Paul Palombo was there to DJ the event and there was supposed to be a couple food trucks to provide food and drink, but they never showed up. One street taco truck did finally arrive around 1 pm., but by then most people found other ways to get lunch.

It was a very interesting arrangement in that show cars were not allowed to be on the grass, but dozens of Motor homes and RVs were camped out on the grass for the three-day event. It seems like a pretty cool way to enjoy the thunder boats if you don't mind the \$600 camping fee.

Linda and I rode the shuttle to the main boat area, and it was very interesting to see the boats up close. There were three different classes of boats and even the small ones with what looked like little motorcycle engines were skipping across the water at near 100 mph speeds. Big cranes were there to lift the boats into and out of the bay. We were surprised that there were only a few boats in each class.

Around 2:30, Charger Steve started to hand out awards for his picks for the car show. The very first award was presented to Linda for her '69 Chevrolet C20 pickup. A few awards later, my number was called for the '55 Chevrolet convertible. Except for the lack of a place to eat, it was a very nice event with very nice San Diego weather. We were told the car show was considered to be successful and that they plan to do it again next year.

September 10 was First Responders Night at Cruisin' Grand in Escondido. This is the night you will see old and rare fire trucks, ambulances, police vehicles and even military vehicles. It was also a night to reflect back 20 years on the attack of the World Trade Center. I had never heard this, but there were 1400 vehicles recovered from

ground zero after the attack on 9/11. The San Diego Port Authority was able to procure a Chevrolet Caprice. After months of restoration efforts, this car is in full running condition, however, all exterior damages and dents were left untouched to help capture the memories of that tragic day.

Kitchen Scoop on White Chocolate Banana Nut Cake

All those months ago at the beginning of the Covid pandemic it seemed many ovens were being used to bake banana bread. Here's a cake recipe that's almost as easy to make, spectacular to look at. This delicious cake

is moist from mashed bananas, flavorful with crunchy nuts, rich with the addition of white chocolate to both the cake batter and the cream cheese icing. Better yet, have some left over? Cut individual slices, put in the freezer on a flat plate or pan. Once frozen, wrap in plastic and store in a freezer bag until you want a special treat.

White Chocolate Banana Nut Cake with White Chocolate Cream Cheese Icing Heat oven to 350 degrees

1 12-ounce Bag white chocolate chips, divided use

For the cake:

Butter, for greasing pans

3 cups All-purpose flour, plus more for pans

2 cups Sugar

1 teaspoon Baking soda

1 teaspoon Ground cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon Salt

3 Eggs, beaten 3/4 cup Vegetable oil

4 Large ripe bananas, mashed1 cup Chopped walnuts or pecans8 ounces Chopped white chocolate

1-1/2 teaspoons Vanilla

For the frosting:

1 8-ounce Package cream cheese, at room temperature

1/2 cup Butter, at room temperature (1 stick)

1 lb Confectioners' sugar, sifted

1 teaspoon Vanilla

1/2 cup Chopped walnuts or pecans 4 ounces Chopped white chocolate

- * Butter and flour 3 (9-inch) round cake pans; set aside.
- * For the cake: In a mixing bowl, stir together the flour, sugar, baking soda, cinnamon and salt. Add the eggs and oil and mix just until the dry ingredients are moistened; do not beat. Stir in the bananas, nuts, white chocolate and vanilla.
- * Divide the batter between the prepared pans and bake for 23-28 minutes, or until a wooden pick inserted in the center comes out clean. Cool the cake layers in the pans for 10 minutes, they turn them out onto racks to cool completely.
- * For the frosting: While the cake cools, make the frosting. In a bowl blend together the cream cheese and butter. Gradually add the confectioners' sugar and vanilla. Stir in the nuts and white chocolate.
- * Fill and frost the cake when it is completely cooled.
