

Annual Chevrolet Nomad Convention Boise, Idaho 7/22-26, 2024 "The Drive" Part 1

So, Ron & Sally Keith from Oceanside with their 56' nomad and Sam & Donna Rindskopf's 57' and their nomad, and myself with my 56' nomad, decided to make "The Drive" to Boise, Idaho for the Nomad convention. JD and I attended the 2009 Nomad convention in Boise, ID so, I was looking forward to going back.

When the time came to make the trip to Boise, ID. Sam and Donna volunteered their time and made for each driver a TRIPTIK for the drive to Boise, as well as the return drive back home for myself, and Ron and Sally. The TRIPTIK gave us the opportunity to see the backcountry, and choose to cruise the scenic routes, and venture into small towns when time permitted.

scenic routes, and venture into small towns when time permitted. We also had to come up with a safe and effective way to communicate between each other while on the road. Driving with two or more cars as well as solo can be a challenge when you realize that the other source of communication is a cell phone, this can





become dangerous and not to mention illegal to use while driving. Using walkie-talkies between drivers/passengers is a practical and safe solution for us. I ordered the same pair of walkie-talkies Sam bought, he was able to synced them to work for each driver. Walkie-talkies is one of many ways to travel when you're driving in a caravan, especially for a single passenger vehicle.



The time has come, and Wednesday, July 17, was an early departure to beat the desert heat to Las Vegas. We met in Temecula and headed to Las Vegas for our first leg of the trip and our first overnight stay. Sam and Donna were the lead car most of the trip, I was in the middle, and Ron and Sally were bringing up the rear.

With heat over 108 degrees on the way to LV, we made it without any major issues. Ron and Sally had a small vapor lock, but were able to drive through it without any problems. After all, it's July and it's HOT!! Thank goodness for A/C. We arrived in LV, this ended our first leg of the trip.

Walking distance from the hotel, Rindskopf's, and I visited the Hollywood Cars Museum, we saw over 1000 vehicles from film&TV... plus the amazing Liberace cars, and the largest collection of Vintage and current Vespa's.

Next morning, Thursday, July 18, another hot day ahead of us and the second leg of the trip, we decided to take the scenic byway drive from Las Vegas to Ely, NV. via the, NV SR-318 Mt. Wilson

backcountry and byway(US 93).

Sam made arrangements in Ely for us to stay at the Historic Hotel Nevada and Gambling Hall. This hotel was built in July 1929 just over 95 years ago.

When we arrived in Ely, NV the weather was so much cooler in the mid 70's with the elevation over 6,500.' Ely, is a remote mountainous town of about 4000 residents who remain there today

History runs deep in Ely, you can find on the main drag over 20 painted murals on historical buildings and sculptures depicting the town's history.

We unloaded and checked into the historic hotel, parked our nomads in front for (photo ops) just in time for thunderstorms to roll through. Ron and Sally decided to rest up and stay dry.





So, Sam and Donna and I, decided to take a stroll downtown in the rain from the hotel to the famous Nevada Northern Railway Station/ Museum for the last train ride of the day on the (Iron Horse) steam locomotive. This National Historic Landmark is one of the last operating steam locomotives of its kind.

The 90 minute guided tour takes you towards the Ruth Mine, through two tunnels, twisting turns, and up real mountain grades. You also have access to coach seating or open-air car. We ended up sitting most of the time in the coach car due to rain off and on during the tour.





The Nevada Northern Railway (Ghost Train of Old Ely), was established in 1905 along the Pony Express route/ Lincoln Hwy, also known as the Loneliest Hwy (50). In 1906 copper was discovered in Ely, NV and was known to be home to a number of copper mining companies, Kennecott Utah Copper being the most famous. The National Landmark, included over 70 buildings structures, and 30 miles of railway tracks.

The next day, Friday, July 19, we woke up to a chilly morning from yesterday's rain, we knew this cool weather wasn't going to last long. After a quick breakfast, we were back on the road and the longest leg of the trip heading to Boise, Idaho will take over five hours.

We continued our drive from Ely, NV through scenic byways, and beautiful views of the surrounding mountains and the countryside.

During the summer months, it's not uncommon when traveling on the scenic routes, where weather conditions change dramatically during the winter, you can come upon the infamous "Tar and Chip" roads. Throughout the our drive towards Boise this continued off and on during our travels. After all, that's part of the journey and hopefully no major damage to the cars...

We finally arrived in Boise, ID mechanical free late afternoon at the Riverside Hotel for the 35th. Annual Nomad Convention.

Let the activities begin.

While technically not true members of the Tri Five Revolution car club, Sam bills us as your Northwest representatives in Spokane, Washington. My wife, Debby, and I have known Sam and Donna for some time now, having met them originally at Hot August Nights in Reno in 2011 I believe. Through the Rindskopfs we became familiar with your club and have visited their homes in Ramona and now Temecula. We have been mentioned by Sam several times over the years and I even submitted a small article back in November 2018 on a show I attended that was special to me. Anyway, it's at Sam's request that I relieve him of his duty to write a blurb on the Nomad convention we just attended, so that he may rest his literary talents for a future write up on this years Hot August Nights. And so, with Ava's permission, I am making this humble attempt.

First of all, it was HOT in Boise! We all arrived there in the midst of a 3 digit heat wave that was 9 days old when we arrived and still counting when we left. To add to that misery, there was smoke in the air from numerous forest fires. In spite of it all, there were over 60 Nomads that made the trip, even though they were expecting closer to 80. There were pretty even numbers of each year represented in the show, with California having the most member attendance, followed



by Washington and then Idaho (25 states in all). Folks were also there from Canada and New Zealand.

There were a few local tours scheduled and some of us caravaned along to most of them. Besides Sam and Donna, we also hung out with Dana Stevens, whom we got to know better. We were actually at our first convention in Rapid City, SD with Dana and her husband, but can't remember if we met them at that time or not. Too long ago! We have made up for that, and have become good friends with Dana now too.

There were a few mishaps along the way with Sam and Donna's 57, but I will let Sam tell that story. He is so much more eloquent and passionate

about this than I am. Besides, Ava might not let me quote him!

The day of the

show and shine wasn't too hot early in the morning, and every member and their families had ballots to fill out to turn in by 11 AM. We finished ours a little before that, but it didn't leave much time to chat with the car owners about their rides, even if you could find them. Needless to say, there weren't crowds of people hanging around in the heat if they didn't have to be there for something. Some comments about judging for the Nomad convention:





There are many categories to be judged on, based on year, present condition and extent of restoration and/or modifications made to each Nomad. They also segregate out those cars driven to the convention vs. those trailered. In addition to all the members voting on each class, there were special panels of judges that focused on Best Paint-Body, Best Interior, and

Best Engine/Driveline for various classes. Therefore, this is a car show that makes each car compete with its peers and not always be up against the high dollar builds so often found in most other shows. That being said, Dana has done a really nice job with her 56 Nomad, yet it has remained in the 56 Modified class. Sam, on the other hand, has gone the extra mile to make his 57 really special, and consequently has ended up in the Custom class. As for our 57, I have strived to keep it in the Modified class as well, to avoid competing where I have no business doing so, yet going the extra mile where I could.

The convention culminates with the banquet and award ceremonies on the last evening. There were over 250 convention attendees, most of which were at these functions. When the awards began, the club officers were to start with the Original Unrestored classes and progress up to the Custom Trailered classes. After those awards, the Specials winners would be announced. And finally the last three awards were to be given to the Best in Show Original, Modified, and Custom classes. These were determined by the members during voting, and were labeled as Peoples Choices on our ballots.





When the awards started, everyone was sitting on the edge of their seats in anticipation. After the first 5 or 6 were given out, there was an 'intermission' to have drawings for door prizes. Then another 8 or 9 awards, followed by more drawings. And yet again another group, etc. The first award given to one of your club members was to Dana for 1st Place 56 Modified. (Sam takes her picture.) The next award of interest to this article was given to myself and Debby for 1st Place 57 Modified. Yay! (Sam takes another picture.)



Following more door prize drawings they got back to awards and then called Sam and Donna up to accept their 1st Place 57 Custom. (This time Dana takes the picture.) Looks like we three had the best in our classes, which was very cool!

The Specials judging awards came next. Best Paint-Body Modified went to Dana, her second award! (Sam back to taking a picture.) Best Interior Modified went to Debby and I, thanks to our new leather interior and custom console. (Sam is really getting into this now.) Then, a surprise; Best Engine/Driveline Modified was awarded to us also, our third! (Sam was muttering to himself by this time.) The ceremony moves on, along with the door prizes and raffles and auctions, until the end is nearly there. The three Best in

Show were last. When they called our name one more time for the Modified Class, it was almost embarrassing to rise

yet again in front of over 200 people to go up one more time to accept a totally unexpected award. Our 4th, our home run! (Sam is now complaining about his knees as he took one last picture.) We were so honored and proud that our Nomad was appreciated that much by all those who judged and voted for it. It was worth enduring the heat, smoke and constant cleaning and worrying that comes with being part of this convention. And we will no doubt do it again some day.

I have one last parting comment that no doubt many of you club members can identify with: You have accompanied the Rindskopfs to many more shows than us over the years. We have been there too, but only during Hot August Nights and the Nomad conventions. We all know how much work and pride
